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# Summary of the April 2019 Dinner Meeting and March 2019 Board of Governors Meeting

### April 17, 2019 Monthly Membership Meeting

- The 1002nd consecutive Monthly Dinner Meeting was called to order at 7:26pm.
- Guest Speaker, Allan Pultyniewicz, Recycling Coordinator, Montgomery County Government explained via a PowerPoint Presentation what can be recycled or not and how.
- Family Friendly night arranged by Andy Wight, Conservation Education Committee Chairman, was acknowledged. President Jack Mandel noted that our future is in the children that attended.
- Phil Taylor and Butch Mezick were commended for their work, as they gave a tour to holders of our conservation easements (representatives from Maryland Environmental Trust and Sugarloaf Countryside Conservancy).
- Total membership is 891. New practice those members who participate from serving time to cleaning up at an event get double the volunteer time they spent working.
- Three new members were inducted into the Chapter.
- Don Perino commented that the monarch butterfly population is growing and has been assisted by the milkweed project. It was declining but it seems to be increasing as the acreage of wintering butterflies in Mexico doubled this past year.
- Montgomery County's Range Committee inspected our ranges, deemed they were safe, and they were approved for continued use for the next couple of years.
- Motion to Adjourn was seconded and approved by acclamation at 9:30pm.

## March 27, 2019 Board of Governors Meeting

- Chapter President Jack Mandel called the meeting to order at 7:30pm.
- 5 Chapter officers were present, including the Past President, and 3 Board members. Walt Allensworth and Shannon Novak were not present. Larry Anderson, Bill Gordon, Scott Harmon, John Lamb, Hope Rutley, R. J. Schisell, Mark Shanker, Phil Taylor, and Lin Tate -members in good standing attended.
- Jack Mandel noted that the creation of a Smart Book would help with the continuity of operations.
- Membership Secretary (Tucker Mostrom) total members 875.
- Archives and Documentation Committee (Co-Chairs Jim Tate and Bill Gordon) – We need to archive our documents but the how – hardcopy, digitally, or electronically – needs to be determined and where will it be stored.
- Chapter Treasurer (Bill Sherrill is stepping down) Scott Harmon reported that the Nominating Committee is involved in this process and anyone can make suggestions to the Board and bring that person up for approval. Former Treasurer Ron Marchessault is handling these responsibilities until an interim Treasurer is voted in.

# **Introduction to Hunting Seminar**

The B-CC IWLA chapter will sponsor its annual "Introduction to Hunting Seminar" on June 1st. If you have never been hunting before, know someone who would be interested, or had a disappointing experience yourself, you are encouraged to attend. Women, men and teens are all welcome.

This nationally recognized and award winning training will include instruction and discussions about conservation and ethical behavior, the five W's and How of hunting, what is hunting success, preparing to go hunting, techniques and skills for being in the woods, trailing game, animal habitats and habits, choosing a treestand location, safety and first aid, being skunked, what can you learn when you miss, advantages and disadvantages of hunting companions, choosing an appropriate bow, long gun or muzzleloader and more. There will be plenty of time for questions.

This seminar does not replace the required Hunter Safety Education courses but is to supplement that course and to expand one's hunting knowledge. The instructors have had many years of hunting experience and what they will share is intended to help participants have a more enjoyable time while hunting.

The seminar will be held at the B-CC IWLA Chapter House. Check in begins at 8:30am and we will start at 9:00am and will continue until at least 4:00pm. The cost is \$15 to cover materials. We will be walking in the woods and fields for at least a mile or more so participants should be prepared for that level of activity. Bring your own lunch, drinks, and wear clothes for outdoor walking and going through briars. Participants should make sure that their clothes are treated with Permethrin or bug spray and exposed body parts with regular bug spray.

# B-CC IWLA and MD/DC Metro FHFH partnership provided thousands of meals during the recent Federal Government Shutdown Crisis

Poverty is the main cause of chronic food insecurity for families, so for years, the **Bethesda-Chevy Chase Chapter of the Izaak Walton League of America** and the **MD/DC Chapter of** *Farmers and Hunters Feeding the Hungry (MD/DC FHFH)* have worked closely together to supply Maryland and District of Columbia metro area food kitchens with thousands of pounds of locally grown and harvested venison to serve thousands of meals.

But sometimes, acute, temporary food insecurity conditions are caused by an extraordinary event like a natural disaster, recession, or plant closing, creating conditions that result in weeks or months of missed paychecks, anxiety, and suffering for working families. It could happen to any of us.

Thousands of MD/DC area residents suffered loss of income during the shutdown of the federal government earlier this year. In response, MD/DC FHFH and B-CC IWLA expanded their existing partnership to help meet the extraordinary needs of their community by directing over 750 pounds of processed venison to those impacted by the shutdown of the Federal Government. That's over 3,000 additional servings of high quality, healthy, lean protein.

In addition, MD/DC FHFH and B-CC IWLA took this opportunity to build and strengthen their relationships with other regional agricultural, farm, and hunger advocacy groups. Working with **Montgomery Countryside Alliance** and its network of ag producers, orchards, and bee keepers located in the **Montgomery County's Agriculture Reserve**, pledges were secured for quantities of Montgomery County-produced grass-fed beef, beef sausage, preserves and jams for use in food kitchens and food bank distribution locations. MD/DC FHFH, B-CC IWLA, and MCA expect to continue working together to create other opportunities to bring these "God given renewable resources" to those in need in our community.

As this year's nesting season began, April brought a flurry of avian activity at the conservation farm. The first big news is that the Purple Martins (PUMA) have arrived!! After overwintering in South America, they began their journey north in February to their breeding grounds. Our first adult male scout was spotted at the farm in early April scoping out our two PUMA houses (each of which contains 14 compartments).

As Theresa Zmola lowered the two PUMA houses to clean them on April 17, a handful of martins approached the houses, then flew away. When she raised the houses about an hour later, the martins magically reappeared, descended and perched on top of the poles, checked out various compartments and best of all, sang and chattered joyfully and continuously for about 20 minthen departed. utes, Mornings at the chapter are a great opportunity to see and hear these marvelous aviators as they begin nest building and rearing their young.

One sad note about our fragile Tree Swallows: The males are fiercely competitive during nesting season for reasons not well understood. Down at the pond I opened one of the boxes only to discover two live adult males and one or two dead females. One of the males flew out, dropping one of the carcasses at the foot of the box. The other live male was face down on his upturned mate's breast, clutching her lifeless body with his feet. He would not fly out of the box, so I closed it and walked away. When I returned several minutes later, the male swallow was still prostrate on the lifeless female. I spoke softly, stroked his feathers, and gently grasped his body. He did not resist, but would not give up his bride. I very gently disengaged his feet from the female's carcass and lifted him outside the box. The poor swallow uttered the most mournful pitiable cheeps all the while. Then, when I opened my hand, he flew off toward the pond.

# B-CC IWLA SUMMER BIATHLON 2019 PRACTICE SCHEDULE

**ELIGIBILITY:** Summer Biathlon is open to all B-CC IWLA members 12 years and older, as well as, sponsored guests. B-CC IWLA members no range fee. **Non-member rate is \$5.00 per session**.

**EVENT:** Running distances at B-CC IWLA are set at 5 kilometers (3.1 miles) split into 5 loops or 3 -- one mile loops. Currently, a single course at each length has been laid out. A short course for those working up to the other distances has been laid out as well. The regulation shooting distance is 50 meters, however, targets are also set at 25 meters for development of the shooting art. There are four shooting stops on the 5km course and two stops on the 3 mile course. Shooting stops alternate between prone (lying down) and off-hand (standing) positions. Five rounds are fired at each stop for a total of 20 shots on the 5km course and 10 shots on the 3 mile course. An equal number of shots are fired from each shooting position.

**SCORING:** Scoring is based on a time to complete basis. A penalty of either one (1) minute or a 50-100 meter penalty lap will be assessed for each shot missed.

**EQUIPMENT:** .22 caliber biathlon rifles are the standard; however, any magazine fed, .22 caliber rifle with either bolt or lever action is permitted. **Only standard velocity** .22 caliber target ammunition is allowed.

# 2019 Annual Chapter Spring Cleanup – Getting It Done!

On Saturday, April 6 nearly 70 of our members showed up at the farm, despite the gray and cold and mist, ready to do the work necessary to get the farm ready for the season. Fortunately for all, our kitchen crew (Jason Griffin, Tucker Mostrom, and Christine Peterson) had breakfast ready, having arrived before dawn to make the coffee, eggs and scrapple. The sun broke through the clouds and gave us a perfect day as volunteers headed to the ranges, the woods, the fields and the groves to put into action the words we say every month at the Chapter dinner meetings. Here's a summary of what got done:

• Larry Anderson's crew went to work in the Christmas tree grove, removing brush, weeds and vines. They did not stop there. They then planted 250 new trees. That's right. Two hundred and fifty. Here are a couple of photographs of their work. If you'd seen the grove before the cleanup, you know the difference is remarkable.





 John Novak's Ponds and Streams gang – removed most of a large tree that had fallen onto the shoreline of the big pond (some of the tree was left in the pond for fish habitat); picked up debris along the shoreline; cut brush and briars around the boat and at another site along the shoreline; set four minnow traps downstream of the dam and overflow basin in an effort to capture any fish that may have escaped the big pond during high flow events (John notes that none were captured, suggesting that no or few fish have been flushed from the big pond as originally thought – further trapping is planned for the upcoming months).

There's more. At the small pond, they planted 50 buttonbushes around the shoreline to control runoff into the pond (these bushes will eventually provide habitat and a food source for ducks and other wildlife); removed the partially submerged turtle platform; picked up some debris along the shoreline; and removed some of the floating algae with a skimmer.

- Brian King, our Trails Committee Chairman, had enough volunteers to run 3 crews. One group cleared all of the downed trees on the West Woods Trails. A separate crew walked all of the North East Woods trails and cleared the paths. The third crew started clean up of the Cathedral-ofthe-Pines and when the other two crews finished, their work, they joined the Cathedral-of-the-Pines crew to help there.
- Over at the rifle and pistol range, R&P Chairman Thoran Menser had a crew of a dozen volunteers. Some of the volunteers recovered the wood usable for old target backers, then built 45-50 new backers. Jose led the charge cleaning the range house. Mark Richards installed new lights. Bob Dowett climbed the roof of the pistol line to clean massive junk out of the gutters. Two volunteers cleared all the rocks on the pistol berm.
- Down at the shotgun range, Pat Tarquinio led a five-stand cleanup crew and work on a new platform.
- The archery range crew got the shooting lanes cleared and the 3-D targets set up for the season.
- Forestry Chairman Joe Snider's crew planted 35 red cedars not far from the big pond, then moved over to some of our other reforested fields to check and perform maintenance on some of the young trees in need of assistance.
- Mr. Blaine Elkins oversaw the clearing of heavy brush and weeds away from the trees in the American chestnut grove, checked their health, and planted some new chestnuts.
- Around the Chapter House, three volunteers cleaned up the yard of limbs that had accumulated over the winter (there were a lot), to enable the safe and successful maintenance of the lawn for the spring and summer.

While all this work was going on, the kitchen crew was busy making slaw and potato salad to accompany the brisket and pork shoulder that our President Jack Mandel had spent many hours slow-smoking (meat was sourced from our Ag Reserve neighbor Rocklands Farm). Our volunteers were understandably hungry; the kitchen was ready. The food was plentiful and delicious.

A lot of sweat, and some blood, was shed in service to the Chapter. Thank you to all our volunteers for their contribution to our mission of stewardship.

# B-CC IWLA Participates in the Annual Potomac River Watershed Cleanup

On April 6, a few members of the B-CC IWLA chapter slipped away from the Chapter House cleanup and joined



other volunteers from the region to help with another clean up effort, this time on the Potomac River. Meeting at the Monocacy Aqueduct/Lock 27 area and heading down to the river with gloves and trash bags in hand, the group comprising of scouts, students, families, and other volunteers worked

hard to collect trash and recycling that had washed up after recent rains. While trash along the riverbank primarily consisted of bottles that where deposited after river flooding, we found lots of polystyrene and building products. Over a 3 hour-period, the 17 volunteers collected 30 yellow bags of trash, 35 blue recyclable bags, six tires, six plastic barrels and other items such as propane tanks, rolls of copper wire, and countless tobacco tins.
