President's Message

This Chapter has long had a relationship with scouts. We have gladly offered our Chapter House, ranges, ponds and forest to the scouts, as well as our financial support. The scouts have over the years bestowed upon us many a scout project — bridges, kiosks, and most recently a beautiful pavilion at the archery range, furnished with hand-made table and chairs (thank you Girl Scout Rachel Behrend). Too, the presence of the scouts has made us a better place for reasons more complex, and not reducible to the presence of a new wooden structure. Our respective missions have much in common, and it has been a fortunate thing for us and for the scouts. I am also glad to relay to you that the number of scouts within our Boy Scouts of America (BSA) Troop 496 has been growing.

But many would say and have said that there was something missing. By way of example, at its last meeting the Board of Governors heard from mothers who were cub scout leaders, and whose daughters wanted to participate with their brothers and friends as scouts – but could not.

The Boy Scouts of America has apparently heard this call. Last year the BSA decided to allow scout troops to include girls, reasoning that the values of scouting – trustworthiness, loyalty, helpfulness, friendliness, courteousness, kindness, obedience, cheerfulness, thrift, bravery, cleanliness and reverence – are all just as relevant and important for young women as for young men

But the decision by the BSA was not the last word on the issue. Instead, the BSA left to the individual chartering entities (like our Chapter) the decision of whether girls would be allowed to be part of the troop. I am happy to report to you that at its January meeting, the Board of Governors agreed with the BSA's reasoning and unanimously voted to include girls within Troop 496 of the National Capital Council. As I write, the formation of that troop is underway. Thank you to Ms. Zoe Welsh, who made the request, to the adult leaders of Troop 496, and to our Scout Liaison Mr. Doug McKenney. A fine way to begin the decade.

Summary of the December 2019 Board of Governors Meeting and January 2020 Dinner Meeting

December 18, 2019 Board of Governors Meeting

The President called the meeting to order at 7:30pm.

- Think about ways, resources, etc. for expanding our membership.
- Archives committee is continuing to document newsletters and older membership lists. They are looking into OCR technology.
- Request from the Beekeeper's association to do another event in March.
- Total for donations set aside this year is \$8,500. \$1,000 for Farmers and Hunters Feeding the Hungry (FHFH), \$5,500 for Poolesville High School ecology program, \$1,250 for Ruffed Grouse Society, \$500 for Poolesville Fire Department, leaving a balance of \$250.
- Front door to Chapterhouse is hard to open. Do not try to open the door until you hear the click from the lock.
- Proposed letter for the comment period for Department of Environment. We are endorsing the Trout Unlimited and DNR plan for release of cold water for trout.

NEW BUSINESS

- Move to transfer \$300 from management reserve to operating account to compensate Poolesville Plumbing and Heating Company. Motion passes unanimously.
- Motion to approve the eight applications. Motion passes unanimously.
- Make the donation to FHFH in the amount of \$1,000. Motion passes unanimously.
- Motion to sign the letter for the Department of Environment. Motion passes unanimously.
- Motion to execute/accept the MOU with GWU with proposed changes. Motion passes with Joe Trotter dissenting, objecting to approving a legal document before it is finalized and properly reviewed by the board.

TALKS FOR THE GOOD OF THE CHAPTER

• Ron Marchessault spoke about possibly doing a gun raffle at the Wild Game dinner. The funds would come out of Management Reserve.

Wednesday, January 15, 2020 Dinner Meeting

- Chapter President Jeff Seaman called the meeting to order at 7:30pm.
- Jeff opened the meeting by informing the membership of next month's speaker, Lori Mayhew, who will speak about conservation and agriculture in Montgomery County.
- Farm Management: Things have been slow so we've had time to work on equipment maintenance. We've sent in soil samples to Texas for testing of ammonia, nitrites, and other chemicals that can be used for fertilization. The testing will allow us to have a better idea of what kinds of cover crops we should use. Ultimately, the idea is to eliminate all additives and achieve peak soil health.
- Wildlife Management: Firearm deer season is over, 18 deer off the property this year, a little lower than previous but in line with state averages. Turkey season is coming up.

- Forestry: Ash spores are killing Ash trees and causing a mess on trails. The trails will be cleaned early this spring.
- Hunter Ethics: A tree stand was removed from the West Woods. You cannot leave a stand out overnight!
- Letter was sent to DNR to release cold water for fisheries.
- People donated approximately \$21,610 for the Land Fund during the fundraising drive.

Chestnut Grove Report

CHESTNUT GENOME GROVE SPRING WORKDAY

The chapter spring cleanup day is scheduled for Saturday, March 28. The Chestnut committee will be cleaning up the Genome Chestnut grove near the campground. This will include planting up to 20 pure breed American Chestnut seeds, placing protective tubes and setting weed-block aprons around them, and replacing weathered weed-block aprons at existing seedlings/saplings. We will also place identifying markers at all 60 seedling locations and perform general clean up.

Unusual Species Observed During the Seneca Christmas Bird Count

The 61st Seneca Christmas Bird Count took place on December 15, 2019. Last month we reported on the results of the count that took place on chapter grounds. This month the focus is on the entire 7 (out of 16 sectors in the count circle), which comprises parts of Fairfax and Loudon Counties in Virginia as well as sections of Montgomery County in Maryland.

The Seneca CBC participants counted 100 species of birds this year, a higher number than in the last two years, plus 3 additional "count week" species-species observed during the week of the count, but not on count day. The birds that we typically see at our feeders were observed-a variety of woodpeckers, cardinals, chickadees, titmice, Dark-eyed Juncos, Blue Jays and Song Sparrows. More than 3,000 crows, 242 Whitethroated Sparrows, 166 Cedar Waxwings, and 265 Redwinged Blackbirds were counted in our sector. In the "unusual species" category this year, Sandhill Cranes showed up again, as they have in the past three years. These birds seem to spend their nights on the Virginia side of the Potomac, in the Algonkin Nature Preserve, then fly over the river to feed in the agriculture preserve during the day and in the golf course on West Willard Road. Snow Geese and Tundra Swans were also observed, as were a Pine Warbler and a Laughing Gull, all considered unusual. The most unusual species seen was a female Rufous Hummingbird, which is a first for the Seneca CBC and brings our cumulative Seneca CBC species to 173. Pine Siskins and Red-breasted Nuthatches, both "irruptive" species-not normal wintertime residents-- were not observed this year.

Many thanks to Jim Nelson whose submission to the Maryland Bird Club was adopted for this report.






Black Powder Day / Muzzleloader Event 2020

Muzzleloading enthusiasts will gather for the annual Black Powder Clinic and Shooting Match, Saturday, April 4th from 9:00am - 4:30pm.

Did you receive a blackpowder firearm as a present and don't know what to do with it? Are you ready to test your skills against others in the afternoon shooting match and compete for prizes? Don't miss out on this marvelous opportunity for knowledgeable instruction, loads of fun, and the unique smell of blackpowder smoke!

Participants will meet at the Rifle & Pistol Range at 9:00am.

Inlines, percussion or flintlock shooters are all welcome. There will be instruction time for new shooters or those with new muzzleloaders while "veterans" and more experienced shooters will sight-in their guns.





to shoot or let Mark Gochnour know in your email that you would like to try one out so he can arrange for a loaner. Learn directly from individuals having experience and knowledge. (Mark is a certified NRA/NMLRA Blackpowder Instructor.) If you have never fired a black powder gun or you have one you have never used before or are having issues with one you have forgotten about in the gun safe, come during the morning but stay for the shoot!



Lunch will be served in the Chapter House around 12:00 noon with the shooting competition beginning at 1:00pm.

Match participants will be provided opportunities to shoot at some unusual novelty targets again this year, including - The Flopping Plate. Targets will be shot at a variety of ranges from up close and out to 100 yards with prizes awarded to individual shooters. An overall Grand Prize could be a frozen turkey or ham. During the

afternoon match, due to safety issues, only muzzleloader shooting participants will be allowed to use the Range. (After its conclusion, Range Officers and their guests may shoot.) Others may shoot in the morning but the range will be under the ERO working with the muzzleloaders but there may be limited shooting lanes due to blackpowder shooters.

FURNACES, FIREPLACES, AND THE BOARDROOM IN **GENERAL**

Our committees have been very active in this chapterhouse this winter (awesome), which has brings with it a few concerns that committee chairs and members should keep in

- NEVER try to light a fire in either fireplace with any furnace or exhaust fan running! Until the chimneys heat up and get strong positive updrafts going, they are very susceptible to suction created by any running furnaces exhaust fans in the chapterhouse. 50% of the intake for the furnace that services the boardroom comes from a return in the boardroom itself. That furnace especially must NOT be running when the fireplace is being lit.
- Please open the flue on any fireplace you are lighting by pulling the handle toward you. Keep the screens in front of the fireboxes to reduce the danger of sparks, especially if you are leaving the chapterhouse. Please also make plans to get back to the chapterhouse in the next day or two to close the flue.
- Please only power up the furnaces / air conditioners you need to be comfortable, and set them to the exact temperature you want the room to be. Nothing gets hotter or colder faster if you set the thermostat for 80°F when you really need 68°F. Be conservative. Open your coat and get comfortable, but maybe try leaving your coat on and setting the furnace a little lower.
- The thermostats will soon be labeled with the areas they serve. Please only activate the units for the parts of the chapterhouse you are actively using.
- The boardroom is there for members and committees to enjoy and meet in. The bookcase from the card room has been moved into the boardroom with outdoor books of all flavors. Get comfortable and find a good read.
- Please return the boardroom to its regular configuration after you are done using it. The boardroom table MUST BE LIFTED when being moved. The legs that swing out to support the leaves are fragile and can easily be broken if the table is dragged.





B-CC IWLA SUMMER BIATHLON PROGRAM 2020 PRACTICE SCHEDULE

MISSION: To provide a venue for novice through worldclass summer biathletes to learn and/or refine the skills inherent to the sport.

To provide a vehicle to introduce athletes of other sports to the shooting sports and consequently an understanding of firearms and the Second Amendment (B-CC IWLA members please recruit, in particular, middle school, high school, and collegiate athletes - freedom/liberty is never more than one generation away from extinction).

ELIGIBILITY: Summer Biathlon is open to all B-CC IWLA members 12 years and older, as well as sponsored guests. B-CC IWLA members no range fee. Non-member rate is \$5.00 per session.

EVENT: Running distances at B-CC IWLA are set at 5 kilometers (3.1 miles) split into 5 loops or 3 – one-mile loops. Currently, a single course at each length has been laid out. A short course for those working up to the other distances has been laid out as well. The regulation shooting distance is 50 meters, however, targets are also set at 25 meters for development of the shooting art. There are four shooting stops on the 5km course and two stops on the 3-mile course. Shooting stops alternate between prone (lying down) and off-hand (standing) positions. Five rounds are fired at each stop for a total of 20 shots on the 5km course and 10 shots on the 3-mile course. An equal number of shots are fired from each shooting position.

SCORING: Scoring is based on a time to complete basis. A penalty of either one (1) minute or a 50-100 meter penalty lap will be assessed for each shot missed.

EQUIPMENT: .22 caliber biathlon rifles are the standard; however, any magazine fed, .22 caliber rifle with either bolt or lever action is permitted. Only standard velocity .22 caliber target ammunition is allowed.

February Dinner Speaker

Spring 2020 Hybrid Chestnut Seed Planting

On Saturday, March 21, the chapter will partner with the Maryland chapter of the American Chestnut Foundation to plant seeds from select mother trees as part of the TACF program for breeding blight resistant American Chestnuts for reintroduction to their original range in the eastern hardwood forest. TACF has pursued a program of crossing American Chestnuts with blight resistant Asian chestnuts. The resulting hybrid seeds were planted and raised to the point of fruiting. These crosses were backcrossed over 2 to 4 generations with pure American Chestnuts. Each generation was assessed for blight resistance and the most resistant progeny were retained.

The nuts we will be planting in the spring are the result of three generations of breeding, on average. The nuts have been collected from 13 different mother trees. Some nuts from each of the same mother trees will also be planted in February at a greenhouse in Baltimore, where they will be inoculated with blight and assessed for resistance, a process called a progeny test. We will plant the balance of the nuts from each mother tree in the spring, outdoors and nurture them through the normal growing season.

Once the assessment of the greenhouse seedlings is complete, TACF will know which mother trees have yielded the most blight resistant progeny. Seedlings from these mother trees that have grown in the B-CC IWLA planting will be selected for inoculation to test their individual levels of resistance in spring 2021. The most resistant of these will be planted in TACF's seed orchards in the fall of 2021 as part of the breeding program.

The BCC/TACF project has the potential to improve the quality of trees in the TACF breeding program, while reducing the time and labor that goes into producing them. It will also enlarge our footprint in conservation efforts in Maryland.

This work is scheduled for Saturday, March 21 at the greenhouse near the archery range starting at 9:00am. Jobs available will be: 1) packing pots with potting mixture, 2) labeling pots, 3) planting chestnut seeds in pots, 4) watering completed plantings, 5) placing chicken wire on the top of the squirrel proof enclosures. Light garden gloves might help if you don't want to get your hands dirty.

Conservation Speaker Dinner Update

On the final Saturday in January our Chapter held its Annual Conservation Dinner, with Jack Mandel acting as presiding host and Mark Gochnour providing his traditional and outstanding spaghetti dinner. And Tucker Mostrom included his Chapter House home-baked bread as well.

Members of the Potomac Valley Chapter of the Ruffed Grouse Society also attended as quests. The program this year featured a presentation on Maryland's participation in a multi-year 13 state study of Woodcock Migration via satellite telemetry. The study had its genesis in continuing concerns about the long-term secular decline in woodcock populations on the Atlantic seaboard. As opposed to the traditional banding procedure with all its limitations, the use of transponders and satellite tracking affords us the opportunity to observe the stop-overs, directions and distance of migrations over time as well as information on the woodcock's choice of cover and habitat. The national Ruffed Grouse Society has provided initial funding for the multi-state project as a basis for securing additional Pittman-Robertson funding.

Our featured speaker was Bill Harvey, Maryland's Project Leader from our Department of Natural Resources. Bill works out of the Cambridge Field Office and shared an impressive power point presentation. We also had the opportunity to hear from Dave Hansroth, RGS' national Middle Atlantic Field Director who directs and oversees the programs and activities of RGS chapters in nine states ranging from New York to Kentucky and Tennessee. We also benefitted from remarks contributed by Dr. Linda Ordiway, Mid-Atlantic and Southern Appalachia Field Biologist who has responsibility for managing RGS habitat projects ranging from Pennsylvania to Tennessee.

Dave presented a special numbered print of a woodcock by Richmond artist N.S Heindl as a gift to our Chapter, while Jack presented a check for our annual contribution to the Potomac Valley Chapter, capping a sum of more than \$14,000 in contributions over recent years, in support of both habitat work in McKee-Beshers and the telemetry project.

Some 60 Members and guests comprised an attentive and appreciative audience and provided one of those special occasions where the Q&A period lasted longer than the formal presentation.
