Proposed Changes to the By-Laws

(Edits in red – to be voted on at the January 2026 Membership Meeting)

Article III – Membership

Section 2.a Any person may become a Probationary Member upon completion of the following steps:

First, the applicant must pre-register interest.

Second, the applicant shall attend two meetings of the Chapter. Acceptable events include: the Monthly Dinner/Members Meeting, New Member Tour, Heritage Day, Family Campout, Christmas Party, New Years Brunch Party, The Wild Game Dinner, Hunter Education (counts as one), Conservation Education Dinner, Spring / Fall Cleanup and monthly Chapter Cleanups. At each of these events, applicant must sign in using a meeting specific QR code to register attendance. Applicants must still attend the 3rd dinner meeting to be sworn in.

Third, the applicant shall file with the Membership Secretary a properly completed application for membership.

Fourth, the Membership Secretary shall submit the completed application after applicable background checks to the Board of Governors at its next regular monthly meeting.

Fifth, the Board of Governors shall review the application and make its recommendation to the Chapter Membership at the following regular monthly meeting of the Chapter.

Sixth, the applicant may be accepted for Probationary Membership by an affirmative vote of a majority of the members present.

Seventh, after being properly sworn in, an accepted applicant shall become a Probationary Member upon payment of the appropriate amounts of monies as prescribed in Article VIII of these By-Laws.

Summary of the November 2025 Board of Governors Meeting and the November 2025 Membership Dinner Meeting

Wednesday, November 19, 2025 – Board of Governors Meeting

- Meeting called to order by President Jerry Murray.
- Board members and guests were introduced.
- NAVHDA Potomac requested use of Chapter House in February for its Annual Meeting. Motion approved for the request.
- Quantico Orienteering Club (QOC) discussed with the BOG about hosting a large orienteering event on the property approximately every 2 years (total of 5 events over 10 years). Motion made to negotiate a commercial-use agreement, subject to a satisfactory written agreement and insurance naming the Chapter as additionally insured. Seconded and passed.
- President Jerry Murray intends to schedule an advance planning meeting in January.
- Grant Applications are in progress/under consideration.
- Current Forestry Chair Blaine Elkins has agreed to cover responsibilities temporarily and form a committee but does not wish to serve as permanent chair.
- Bookkeeping Support needed with bookkeeping/QuickBooks skills, to ensure accounts are current before advance planning/finance meeting.
- Inventory and appraise the six donated firearms to decide whether to use them for auction, raffle, or other fundraising.
- Draft a formal list of pre-approved events that can count as the first two "dinner meetings" for new members.
- Work-Hour Policy – retired status and past-president status do not automatically exempt members from work hours. Exemptions are Board approved case-by-case (primarily medical hardship).
- Demonstrate to members how to log hours individually using the new system.
- Need more certified food managers for Chapter House events. Consider hosting another ServSafe/food manager class at the Chapter or organizing a coordinated online/proctored session.
- Interest expressed in hosting more range-related classes at the Chapter (e.g., NRA RSO classes).
- Reserve Chapter House for Hunter Education on April 25–26 and September 12–13. Coordinate with other committees to ensure range and grounds availability.

NEW BUSINESS:

- Hunting and trapping coyotes on chapter property. Several experienced hunters testified to a significant increase in coyote presence on the property, affecting deer and other wildlife. Continue discussion at next BOG on a formal policy for hunting/trapping coyotes on chapter property, compliant with MD regulations and chapter safety rules.

Meeting adjourned at 9:45pm.

Wednesday, November 19, 2025 – Membership Dinner Meeting

- 1,081st meeting called to order by President Jerry Murray at 7:30pm.
- New and returning members were welcomed.
- Emphasized importance of the Land Fund and encouraged donations during renewals.

Counting birds is both enjoyable and educational. Please consider joining other chapter members who count species and numbers of birds observed within species on weekends through March 15.

Our data is reported to Cornell University's Lab of Ornithology, along with data submitted from thousands of other participants across the country. Our data helps Cornell scientists analyze shifts in bird species and numbers within species in the United States and Canada. Next Spring the Cornell Lab will publish results by geographic area. Maryland falls in the Lab's southeast region.

We welcome and seek new participants. Please email me if you can help, trina65@verizon.net. I will send you our tally sheet and instructions. Count birds for at least an hour on two successive days, or on one day if you are pressed for time, from the comfort of the chapter house.

B-CC IWLA Summer Biathlon Program 2026 Practice Schedule

MISSION: To provide a venue for novice through world class summer biathletes to learn and/or refine the skills inherent to the sport.

To provide a vehicle to introduce athletes of other sports to the shooting sports and consequently an understanding of firearms and the Second Amendment.

(B-CC IWLA members – please recruit, in particular, middle school, high school, and collegiate athletes – freedom/liberty is never more than one generation away from extinction.)

ELIGIBILITY: Summer Biathlon is open to all B-CC IWLA members 12 years and older, as well as, sponsored guests. **B-CC IWLA members rate is \$2.00 per session. Non-member rate is \$5.00 per session.** **SEASON PASS:** member – \$25; non-member – \$65

EVENT: Running distances at B-CC IWLA are set at 5 kilometers (3.1 miles) split into 5 loops or 3 -- one-mile loops. Currently, a single course at each length has been laid out. A short course for those working up to the other distances has been laid out as well. The regulation shooting distance is 50 meters, however, targets are also set at 25 meters for development of the shooting art. There are four shooting stops on the 5km course and two stops on the 3 mile course. Shooting stops alternate between prone (lying down) and off-hand (standing) positions. Five rounds are fired at each stop for a total of 20 shots on the 5km course and 10 shots on the 3 mile course. An equal number of shots are fired from each shooting position.

SCORING: Scoring is based on a time to complete basis. A penalty of either one (1) minute or a 50-100 meter penalty lap will be assessed for each shot missed.

EQUIPMENT: .22 caliber biathlon rifles are the standard; however, any magazine fed, .22 caliber rifle with either bolt or lever action is permitted. **Only standard velocity .22 caliber target ammunition is allowed.**

Small Pond Trout Fishing

Rules

1. Trout fishing is for chapter members and immediate family only.
2. Anglers 16 and older must have a Maryland fishing license and \$5.00 trout stamp. Those aged 65 and older qualify for a senior consolidated fishing license; no trout stamp required.
3. Fish from shore only; do not use the boat.
4. Anglers may keep 3 trout per day - no size limit.
5. Anglers may use only one fishing rod at a time.
6. Anglers should park in the chapter house parking lot.
7. Pick up and take all trash out of the small pond area when leaving.

Coyote Control Project on the B-CC IWLA Property

Chapter Members are aware that coyotes have been increasing in numbers and their activity has caused concern with their impact on other animals on the property. Although coyotes can be hunted almost 365 days a year, usually other game is being sought so they are not a priority for most hunters. Individuals or groups of hunters will be engaged in an effort to reduce the coyote predation on the property next month. Those engaged will follow Chapter Hunting Rules and the SOPs and abide by Maryland State Hunting Regs.

Coyotes may be hunted February 5 – 28. Any hunting after dark will require notification and approval 48 hours ahead of time.

Chapter Members will be informed by email blast about this opportunity and the details regarding how to participate.

Each hunter must register using a QR code linked to a Google Document and will be required to follow specific rules as some hunting might be done after dark. Any game violations will be submitted to the DNR and may result in charges and membership removal.

Any coyotes killed must be reported to Mark Gochnour, mgdonutman@gmail.com, or John Lamb, jpatricklamb@aol.com, and must be written down in the logbook next to the Chapter House door within 24 hours. Hunters killing any coyotes are responsible for the respectful disposal of said animal and they are not to be left on the chapter property.

This coyote control project is being done on a trial basis this year and may be repeated in subsequent years. A report of this effort will be submitted to the Board of Governors.

Seneca Christmas Bird Count

Birds Counted on B-CC Chapter Izaak Walton League Conservation Farm December 14, 2024

These are the total birds counted on the Conservation Farm by two field parties on the Farm and two feeder watchers at the Chapter House feeders. Species total – 30 (down from 38 last year, 42 in 2023, and 41 in 2022). Total birds counted – 299 (way down from 576 last year, 1,997 in 2023, and 453 in 2022). These results are not surprising. The weather on December 14 was very cold and windy after an overnight snow fall, which made it very difficult to find birds. In spite of that, the 6 people counting in the field parties and 2 at the feeders managed to turn up a good array of species, including some not found last year, and good numbers of birds, including better numbers than last year on a number of species. Species not found in 2024 are marked with an *. Parenthetical comments compare some totals to last year's count on the Farm.

We await a decision in January for the 2026 National Rifle Association (NRA) Foundation State Fund grant application number 26MD015 Project: "Shot Stop Shield: Securing Our Range" in support of our lead containment shot curtain funding.

I have requested Pittman-Robertson Funding for Lead-Shot Containment at Izaak Walton League Range from MD DNR Federal Grants Manager at the Wildlife and Heritage Service which is in deliberation.

Our request ID #14785 for funding from The Richard King Mellon Foundation to install a lead-shot containment curtain system at shotgun range to capture/recycle 95%+ lead-shot, prevent watershed pollution, protect wildlife habitats, and promote safe, sustainable hunting recreation has been assigned to their grant review process where it will be given careful consideration.

I have obtained proposals for installation of the lead shot containment curtain from Midwest Netting and Net Connection. Both companies have submitted samples of the fabric to be used for evaluation.

I am actively working with Heritage Montgomery for the submission of The Maryland Heritage Areas Authority FY27 Project Grant for \$100,000 to rehabilitate the Willard Log House and outbuildings.

We have obtained estimates from several contractors to include CraftWright Timber Frame Company and Fitzgerald's Heavy Timber both restoration specialists for historic preservation.

The BCC IWLA Endowment request for Orienteering proposal is ready for submittal Q1 2026.

I am working with The Conservation Fund Director for the State of Maryland to explore options for land grant endowments.

Did you receive a blackpowder firearm as a gift or inherited one and don't know what to do with it? You don't want to miss out on this marvelous opportunity for knowledgeable instruction, loads of fun, and the unique smell of blackpowder smoke! Would you like to test your skills against others in the afternoon shooting match and compete for prizes?

Participants will meet at the Rifle & Pistol Range at 9:00am. (Check-in beginning 8:45am) Inline, percussion, or flintlock shooters are all welcome. There will be instructional time for new muzzleloader shooters to develop a workable shooting load, for "veterans" and more experienced shooters to sight-in their guns, and for all to practice shooting.
