President's Message

We lke's are a conservation-minded bunch. Our roots are in fishing and hunting, and through a 11% tax on hunting equipment the Pittman-Robertson Federal Aid in Wildlife Restoration Act of 1937 has recently generated over \$750,000,000 a year for wildlife conservation. Most people pay this gladly to support the many conservation programs that would not exist without these funds. So this begs the obvious question... in what other ways can directly you participate in conservation? The answer to this depends on your nature and your capabilities, and history is full of interesting examples of the many different ways people have contributed.

Political: Nevada Senator Key Pittman and Virginia Congressman Absalom Robertson went the route of political advocacy. Their act was signed into law by Franklin D. Roosevelt on September 2, 1937. Notable species that have come back from the brink of extinction since the implementation of this act include deer, wild turkeys, and wood ducks. At the time this act was signed, deer had been virtually eradicated from land east of the Mississippi by market hunting.

Activism/Civil Disobedience: The origin of the term "tree hugger" dates back to 1730 when 294 men and 69 women of the Bishnoi Hindu religion died while trying to protect trees in their village from being turned into building materials for a palace. They clung to the trees while being slaughtered by foresters. However, their actions lead to a royal decree prohibiting the cutting of trees in any Bishnoi village. More recently, Julia 'Butterfly' Hill, who was born on February 18, 1974, became famous as an American Environmental Activist by living in a California Redwood tree for 738 days from December 10, 1997 to December 18, 1999 to prevent it from being cut down by the Pacific Lumber Company. Ultimately a resolution was reached where the tree was saved, including a 200-foot buffer zone around it. Hill and other activists raised \$50,000 during the cause, which was given to the logging company as part of the resolution, and subsequently this money was donated to Humboldt State University for sustainable forestry research.

Direct involvement: Personally, I'm more of a 'boots on the ground' type and being pretty non-confrontational could not recommend chaining yourself to a tree. Luckily our IWLA chapter provides many opportunities for you to pitch in on conservation efforts and make a difference. You can help Larry Anderson plant trees in the springtime. You can assist Phil Taylor, our farm chair, in sustainable farming which improves soil health and provides food for local citizens and animals that live in our woods. If you would like to participate in local legislative affairs in the MoCo AG Reserve, Bob Cissel can point you in the right direction. John Novak, our Ponds and Streams Chair, can always use a hand on workdays for the many projects he leads to protect our waterways. Plus, there are many other ways to participate as well. Wednesday, March 22, 2023 - Board of Governors Meeting

- Blaine Elkins provided an update on a proposed repair for the electric feed at the archery pavilion.
- Blaine Elkins, American Chestnut Chair, talked about a genetically modified chestnut seedling that may be released soon, the Darling 58. This has been created to help restore the native species. If we can get these, Blaine would like to get the Board's approval to remove the Chinese chestnut hybrids from the chapter and replace them with these. We would also need to get the SCB approval. He will keep the Board updated.
- Jack Lamb, Chapter House Chair, talked about the meeting he had on March 12 about the stove and how we are gathering pricing for a new unit.
- Dan Dutton, Handbook Committee Chair, stated that committees need to review and provide updates for their sections of the handbook. There was discussion about putting together a PR book for the chapter.

Chapter Elections and the Nominating Committee

Our Chapter is entirely volunteer run, and our officers and board of governors all serve one-year terms. Terms begin on September first of each year and conclude at the end of August. April Meeting Speaker – Bob Cissel

At our April Dinner Meeting, Chapter member Bob Cissel talked about current and pending legislation in Annapolis and Rockville that affects the Montgomery County agricultural producers. The topics discussed included:

- The Montgomery Electric Bill (now law) that mandates that by 2026 all new housing in the county must use electricity for all appliances, heating and cooling. No gas or oil. Agricultural buildings have been exempted.
- Blower bill to ban the sale of gas leaf blowers in the county by 2024 and use of gas blowers in the county by 2025 went back to committee.
- Of note, 90% of the agriculture in Montgomery County is grain production and the average age of farmers nationwide is 59.
- Power plant in Dickerson has been sold and the new owner is looking to keep the gas fired plant as a back-up energy source, install a solar power field, and build a data center on the property.
- The country and rural roads program in the county (designated by brown road signs) has over 100 roads. The Master Plan that set up the program is currently under review because many of these roads are in the agricultural reserve and the minimal maintenance given these roads results in clogged culverts and overgrown side vegetation. This creates a lack of clearance for the farmer's combines and they must go around these roads to get from one field to another.
- There is currently a moratorium on forest mitigation credits.
- In Montgomery County, there are 330,000 acres of farmland and 37,000 of parkland.

THEY'RE BACK!

Hummingbirds have returned to the Chapter. Many thanks to George and Cora Coakley for providing the feeders (several around the Shotgun Range) and replenishing them as needed with nectar.

Although they may be some of the smallest birds in the world, they are known to flap their tiny wings at up to 90 beats per second. Hummingbirds need to eat a lot to maintain their momentum. They consume half their body weight in bugs and nectar by feeding every 10-15 minutes and visiting 1,000-2,000 flowers per day.



At your home, help these beautiful birds get the nutrients they need by providing them with their favorite treat–nectar. This hummingbird sweet treat can be made with a few simple ingredients. By filling your feeder with the nectar delight, you can watch these beautiful little birds feed and flitter all day.

Materials:

- 1/4 cup refined white sugar
- 1 cup boiling water
- Bowl
- Spoon

Note: Please do not substitute honey or use red food coloring, both could prove harmful to birds. It is recommended to fill the feeders to capacity and to change the nectar every 3 days during very warm weather so that the nectar doesn't get moldy or rancid.

Steps:

- 1. Mix sugar and boiling water until sugar is dissolved.
- 2. Cool and fill feeder.
- 3. Hang up your feeder outside and wait for the hummingbirds to come.

You can also attract hummingbirds and provide additional nectar by planting nectar-bearing flowers and shrub plants in your yard, such as: Salvia, Fuchsia, Hibiscus, Azalea, Zinnias, or Cosmos.



The Purple Martins have returned! Come out to the chapter and enjoy watching the colony (about 100 individual martins) vocalizing as they go about the business of selecting a nesting compartment, building nests, and laying eggs. There are 46 nesting trays, consisting of 14 in each of our two martin houses and 18 gourds. The martins, who migrate from

South America in late winter to breed in North America, will stay through late July, so you will have many opportunities to enjoy them. The chapter is enormously grateful to Jim Tate and Lin Schmale Tate who donated the martin houses many years ago.

Eastern Bluebirds and Tree Swallows once again have begun nesting on our beautiful conservation farm. As of late April, Eastern Bluebirds have built 11 nests and laid 24 eggs and produced 7 young, while Tree Swallows have constructed five nests and laid 4 eggs. The first bluebird egg was laid on April 2, while the first tree swallow egg was laid on April 27.

The NestWatch team needs a few additional volunteers. Please email me at trina65@verizon.net if you can help. Nestbox checking is educational, the fellowship is enjoyable, the team can train you, and nest monitoring hours qualify for the chapter's work credit. Come join us!

Introduction to Hunting Seminar

The Bethesda-Chevy Chase Chapter of the Izaak Walton League of America will sponsor its annual "Introduction to Hunting Seminar" on Saturday, June 3. If you have never been hunting before, know someone who would be interested, or had a disappointing experience yourself, you are encouraged to attend. Women, men, and teens are all welcome.

This nationally recognized and award winning training will include instruction and discussions about conservation and ethical behavior, the five W's and How of hunting, what is hunting success, preparing to go hunting, techniques and skills for being in the woods, trailing game, animal habitats and habits, choosing a tree stand location, safety and first aid, being skunked, what can you learn when you miss, advantages and disadvantages of hunting companions, choosing an appropriate bow, long gun, or muzzleloader and more. There will be plenty of time for questions.



This seminar does not replace the required Hunter Safety Education courses but is to supplement that course and to expand one's hunting knowledge. The instructors have had nearly 100 years of hunting experience and what they will share is intended to help participants have a more enjoyable time while hunting.

The seminar will be held in the B-CC IWLA Chapter House and outdoors. Check in begins at 8:30am and we will start at 9:00am and continue until around 4:00pm. The cost is \$15 to cover materials. We will be walking in the woods and fields for at least a mile or more so participants should be prepared for that level of activity. This stocking was recommended in Solitude's report on the electrofishing study of the small pond conducted in October 2022. These fish will provide forage for small pond largemouth bass as well as enhance the bluegill fishery for kids and adults alike. A solar powered automated fish feeder will be installed next month and should provide daily dependable feeding for these hungry bluegills. UPDATE FROM THE ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE

Below are updates on the lead reclamation, suspension of activity on shotgun range, and easement and future activities as of April 30, 2023

Lead Reclamation

The NRI/FSD plans have been approved. The Soil Conservation District has approved the Erosion and Sediment Control plan. The final piece of the permitting process the Forest Conservation Plan (FCP) is complete and ready for submission to the Planning Department. We have filed a Fee Reduction Request with the Planning Department to have the plan review fee for the FCP reduced from \$107,000.00 to \$3,080.00. Once this is approved and payment is made the Planning Department will accept the FCP for review. We should hear from the Planning Department on the Fee Reduction Request shortly.

Once the FCP is approved we can schedule the Contractor to install the sediment and erosion control items and then schedule in the lead reclamation Contractor, En Range.

Suspension of Activity on Shotgun Range

On May 2 the surveyors from our engineers WSSI will begin staking out the stream and wetlands buffers from the shotgun range to Izaak Walton Way. Once the stake out is complete in the shot fall area the shotgun committee may conduct empirical testing to see which shooting stations may be reopened without the risk of shot falling in restricted areas pursuant to the conservation easement or state and federal law.

An annotated drawing of the shot fall zones has been sent to Richard Petticord so he can prepare a proposal for consulting services to assist the Chapter in devising a shotgun program that ensures future operations are in compliance with the conservation easement and any other applicable restrictions.

Easement and Future Activities

On April 27 the wetlands professionals from Wetlands Studies and Solutions walked through the archery 3-D courses in the Wildlife Refuge Woods to ensure there were no other unidentified wetlands in areas actively in use. Fortunately, no new wetlands were identified. Once the stream buffers are staked out the Chapter will be able to make alterations to the 3-D courses to avoid activities in the perennial stream buffers.
