Hunter's Ethics Report

The hunter's ethics committee has had its first report from our neighbor to the north of a deer that was gutted on his property next to his field edge. It is our responsibility as members to **NOT TRESPASS** on our neighbor's property. The first step to hunting our farm is to register to hunt on our website. In doing so you acknowledged that you have read our hunting rules and regulations and that you know our property lines. The property boundaries to the north are marked with a standard blue slash on trees along that boundary.

DEER RECOVERY PERMISSION PROCEDURES

If you have a wounded deer that travels off our property onto Joe Morin's, Vicky Van Winkle's, or Billy Willard's property, we must get verbal permission to enter their property before we cross the property line. To gain access you must contact me by cell number at 301 467-0645. I will then contact the neighbor for permission with instructions from them on how to proceed. We are not to carry a bow or firearm under any circumstances onto their property.

Bob Cissel's farm borders the two 50-acre lots north of the Chapter. It is across Willard Road from the creek north to the golf course entrance. If you shoot a deer that crosses the road and you can see it dead in the field, go ahead and retrieve it. Please drag it back across the road and gut it on B-CC's property. If you blood trail the deer onto their farm, please back out and call Bob at 301 775-8978. He will come help you track and recover the deer.

PUNISHMENT FOR TRESPASSING

If you are caught trespassing, DNR will be called, and an investigation will occur. The Board of Governors will be notified, and you will be referred to them to determine what action will be taken. The precedent has been set that you will lose your hunting privileges for up to two years and that you may lose your membership if caught hunting on our neighbor's property. Don't let this be YOU.

In closing, I have heard people saying that all the deer are on our neighbor's property. This is simply not true. The grass may seem to be greener on the other side of the fence but it just isn't. To protect our hunting heritage and privileges, it's of the utmost importance to not trespass.

Ponds & Streams Committee Report

- The third pump at the big pond has been replaced and all three pumps are working. The battery, timer, and controller at the small pond have been replaced and the aerator is now working. The fish feeder at the big pond is working. Both ponds had successful largemouth bass and bluegill spawning.
- Several workday projects are planned for the October 15 Fall Cleanup. A fishing event for kids is planned around the end of October.
- Solitude Lake Management will be electroshocking the large and small pond later in October for fish management studies.
- The SOS (Save Our Streams) program has been out twice this year to take samples from the streams. They will be out once more this year. This is a good learning experience for kids.
- Participating in the Salt Watch Program to monitor the salt mix that is placed on the roads.
- Looking into building a wooden bridge across the outflow channel at the large pond to help get the mowers over the outflow rocks. Need three or four poles 25-30 foot long to span the rocks.


Centrarchidae – Sunfish Family



Centrarchidae, the sunfish family of 30 species in North America, is composed of a diverse group of warmwater fishes well known to freshwater anglers - kids and adults alike. There are sixteen sunfish species reported to occur in Maryland freshwaters. This family includes the popular bluegill, crappie (black and white), and black basses (largemouth and smallmouth). In addition to these species, the redear sunfish, redbreast sunfish, green sunfish, and longear sunfish are found in Maryland freshwaters. No members of the sunfish family occur in marine waters; however, redbreast sunfish, largemouth bass, and pumpkinseed may at time be found in brackish waters. Largemouth bass, bluegill, and redear sunfish are found in the big pond while largemouth bass and bluegill occur in the small pond. Largemouth bass is the largest member of the sunfish family and may reach a length of 35 inches while the smallest member is the banded sunfish at 1.3 to 2.8 inches.



Some species of the sunfish family found in the Potomac River drainage in Maryland are not known to be native to this area. These species include the largemouth bass, smallmouth bass, white crappie, rock bass, bluegill, longear sunfish and redear sunfish. Most sunfish species were originally described by early naturalists in the 1700's and the 1800's in the Mississippi River and St. Lawrence River drainages. Today, sunfish species occur in ponds, lakes, reservoirs, and streams because they have been stocked throughout the U.S. by individuals and state and federal fish and wildlife agencies. The most common species stocked in impoundments are largemouth bass and bluegill. Typically, stocking of bluegill and largemouth occurs at a ratio of one largemouth bass for every 10 bluegills per acre of water. Sunfish species are highly adaptable to impoundment environments and thrive quite well with adequate food sources and water quality (especially pH, temperature, and dissolved oxygen) that is conducive to their survival. Sunfish may tolerate a low pH of 4, but the





normal range for good survival is pH 6.5-8.5. Suitable dissolved oxygen concentrations should not fall consistently below 5.0 milligrams per liter; however, dissolved oxygen as low as 2.0 milligrams may be tolerated for short periods of time. Water temperatures reaching the mid 80's degrees Fahrenheit are tolerated by most sunfish.

Sunfish feed on a variety of food organisms. These prey items include terrestrial and aquatic insects, crustaceans (crayfish), worms, mollusks (clams and snails), and fish. Mouth size is a determining factor in prey selection and hunger likely plays a role. The largemouth bass, an opportunistic feeder, preys heavily on fish and can take a range of sizes given its large mouth; it may also prey on frogs, snakes, and even small ducklings. Many of the lures used to catch largemouth bass imitate fish, frogs, and worms. There is an almost endless array of lures designed to attract and catch largemouth bass. One only needs to go to Bass Pro Shops to see the numerous shelves of bass lures. On the other hand, fishing for bluegills is relatively easy and simple; one only needs a cane pole, plastic bobber, and earthworm. However, at time, large bluegills may also strike a lure intended for a largemouth bass.

Sunfish are nest builders. They spawn in shallow circular cavities constructed along the shoreline of streams, ponds, and lakes. The male digs the nest cavity in gravel or suitable substrate by fanning with the tail to remove silt and debris. Spawning for most sunfish occurs during spring to early/midsummer. The male guards the nest after spawning occurs and only leaves to chase away predators or other fish. During the period of guarding the nest, the male is vulnerable to capture, as they tend to remove any foreign objects such as lures that land or come near the nest. Bass fishermen are well aware of this characteristic of largemouth bass. The female largemouth bass leaves the nest area after spawning and may spawn again at other nest sites.

In summary, sunfish are a diverse and a highly adaptable family of warmwater fish providing a wide variety of angling opportunities in Maryland freshwaters. These colorful and obliging fish can be found just about anywhere there is suitable habitat. So grab your fishing gear and head to the big pond, small pond, a state impoundment, or the nearby Potomac River for some light tackle action.



DRAGNet Global Research Study

Our beautiful conservation farm will participate in a global research study - the Disturbance and Resources Across Global Grasslands Network- whose aim is to assess the factors that influence plant community recovery and assembly after disturbance in herbaceous dominated ecosystems. Dr. Betsy von Holle will be conducting this 10-year study in coordination with approximately 75 other sites worldwide. Betsy works for the National Science Foundation, Division of Environmental Biology and is an Associate Research Professor at George Washington University. She is on sabbatical this year and wishes, inter alia, to work on the disturbance and restoration project.

Arthur Belendiuk and Phil Taylor helped Betsy von Holle determine a 35 x 25 meter plot on the B-CC IWLA farm that fit the criteria of the study and that is a good location with respect to farm management. The site will be near the Boy Scout camp and is located in the field across and down from the chestnut tree enclosure. T-posts will mark the site, with flagging on the posts and individual plots, and signs will be placed to explain the goals of the project. Wildlife Report

Early deer muzzleloader season starts on Thursday, October 20 and runs through Saturday, October 22. In region B (our region), muzzleloader season continues Monday, October 24 and continues until Saturday, October 29. Antlered deer may be harvested only October 20 through October 22; antierless deer may be harvested throughout the 10-day season. There is no muzzleloader deer hunting on Sundays during this season. Deer archery season is open throughout the muzzleloading season and archery hunters may hunt on Sundays until 10:30am. We ask that all members, whether hunting or not, wear something with high visibility colors while on the farm during deer firearms seasons.

From casual observations and reports, the soft mast crop appears to be good. The soft mast most common on our farm includes grape and persimmon. The hard mast crop this year appears to be spotty at best. While we have many species of oaks in our woods, only the saw-tooth species seem to be producing a reasonable crop of acorns this year. There are a good number of hickory nuts dropping now, and the walnut crop is below average. At this writing, the statewide mast report has not been published, but again casual observations suggest a general low mast crop across the state. Typically MD DNR correlates a higher deer harvest when mast crops are low due to the increased movement of deer in search of food. Thanks to the efforts of our farm committee, our fields are in good shape, with a variety of grass crops, legumes, root crops and standing corn. This abundance should support a wide variety of wildlife throughout the winter.

As a reminder, our chapter follows the guidelines and rules of MD DNR hunting on public land by **not** allowing baiting on our farm. This restriction will also apply to salt blocks and licks. Likewise, treestands, ground blinds, or any other hunting equipment may not be left overnight in the woods. These prohibitions are designed to give all our hunters/members equal access to spots in the woods.

We ask that all hunters be safe and courteous, read and follow our rules, and respect the all property lines. B-CC IWLA chapter website has our updated rules and a variety of methods to distinguish our property lines. The Chapter's Trail Guide on the website is a good way to familiarize yourself with the trails and the boundaries of our Conservation Farm.

All members intending to hunt on our farm must acknowledge that they have read our rules and understand where our property lines are by registering on our website (see link below). This is a yearly requirement.

Besides registering on our website, all hunters must have with them:

- current hunting license with all applicable stamps
- photo ID
- current BCC chapter membership card
- current vehicle decal displayed on their vehicle

We do not have permission to hunt or go on any of our neighbor's properties. If you have a wounded deer that travels off our property onto Joe Morin's, Vicky Van Winkle's, or Billy Willard's property, we must get verbal permission to enter their property before we cross the property line. To gain access you must contact Scott Harmon by cell number at 301 467-0645. He will then contact the neighbor for permission with instructions from them on how to proceed. We are not to carry a bow or firearm under any circumstances onto their property.

Bob Cissel's farm borders the two 50-acre lots north of the club. It is across Willard Road from the creek north to the golf course entrance. If you wound a deer that crosses the road and you can see it dead in the field, go ahead and retrieve it. Please drag it back across the road and gut it on B-CC's property. If you blood trail the deer onto their farm, please back out and call Bob at 301 775-8978. He will come help you track and recover the deer.

Our farm is considered private property (MD-DNR land code 430 for harvest check in), so your current valid membership card is used as the written permission to hunt as required by MD DNR and must be carried along with your valid hunting license. Also, a current B-CC IWLA chapter vehicle decal must be visible in all vehicles on the farm. We ask that deer and turkeys taken on our farm be recorded either in our game logbook, located outside the chapterhouse's main door, or by sending an email to andupton9@hotmail.com. When reporting your deer or turkeys, we ask for the following information; your name, doe or buck (antler count), date and weapon used, and the total number of ticks found on the ears of your deer. Other details may also be included such as estimated weight or unusual features.

Statewide only 2 bucks may be taken throughout the hunting year, only one of which can have less then 3 points on an antler. Only one buck may be taken in a weapon year. A bonus buck may be taken in region B (our region) after purchasing a bonus buck stamp and can be used for any weapon season, still maintaining the antler point restrictions. Fluorescent pink is an approved legal color like fluorescent orange that hunters must wear to promote hunter safety. This change will require all of hunters to watch for 2 colors in the field that will alert us to the presence of other hunters.

Bears are protected in Montgomery County and we adhere to the policies setup by MD DNR. We ask that all of our members be aware of the possibility of encountering a bear does exist while on our farm.
