President's Message

We are doing things, the shutdowns, closures, etc., notwithstanding. Since the closure orders were issued from Annapolis, trees have been planted on the Farm. Trails have been cleared in the woods and at the archery range. Turkeys are finally being hunted. The new houses for the purple martins are up and occupied. Cover crops are doing their work in our fields, enriching the soil, pollinator-friendly cover and sunflowers are planted.

At the old greenhouse, hundreds of nascent chestnut trees are being brought along in squirrel-proof cages. The fish have been fed. Biologists from Georgetown and George Washington Universities have begun insect studies on the Farm. Our website and Facebook pages are blooming weekly, and updates to our Conservation Education and Archaeology pages are underway. Our Campgrounds website page now features bushcraft videos by our Chair Jack Kang. The League's National office was so impressed it has posted Jack's videos on its own website.

And we are planning things. As of this writing, our Security and Range Chairs are preparing protocols to be used when the ranges can re-open. Our Archery Committee Chair has plans to replace and repair bridges on the 3-D range and to update the pavilion. Our Log Cabin Committee Chair is assembling a plan to repair elements of the cabin and the spring house, and to encourage their use for events (to get your name on the list of cabin-restorers, contact our Log Cabin Chair, Doug Martin, at dwm.wash.dc@gmail.com or sign up on the "Volunteer" page on the website). Youth and women's shooting classes are in the works. There are rumors of a big party in the fall

There is and will be more. Keep reading and stay tuned, via the new website and our Facebook page. And look for an email invitation to our next monthly meeting via Zoom. Get outside!

Update – The Governor's Order and Our Ranges . . .

Yesterday (Wednesday, May 6), Governor Hogan issued an Executive Order which expands the scope of the "permitted outdoor activities" previously listed in the prior Executive Orders. It specifically identifies "small group sports" such as golf, tennis "and similar activities; . . . recreational fishing, hunting, shooting and archery;" It specifically indicates that outdoor archery and shooting ranges may open. Gatherings of 10 or more are still prohibited, and social distancing protocols must be adhered to.

I want you to know that the Chapter is ahead of the game, due to the coordinated efforts of our Security and Range Chairs. Hats off to them and to our very own public health advisor, Board member Sean David Waterman, who has been providing guidance.

Here is a statement from our Security Chair about what has happened so far and what to expect in the coming weeks:

As precautionary measure, Viral Cleanse LLC, which is a Chapter member owned company, visited the Chapter on May 6 and performed a decontamination of the following areas: interior and exterior of the Chapter House, Shotgun and R&P range houses and shooting positions.

At this time, while the Chapterhouse, Shotgun and R&P ranges are still closed, the Chairmen are creating range specific guidelines and procedures for the health and safety of our members. The R&P Range is aiming to open up on Memorial Day weekend and the Shotgun range will follow in June. The guidelines will be communicated via email before the opening of each range.

The Archery Chair has developed operation protocols and will open the range soon. Stay tuned.

Summary of the March 2020 Board of Governors Meeting and April 2020 Dinner Meeting

March 22, 2020 Board of Governor's Meeting

- President Jeff Seaman sent a letter to the Office of Legal Counsel for Maryland to clarify whether or not people can use the chapter while keeping with "social distancing" guidance.
- Joe Trotter read the minutes, which were approved unanimously.
- We are overall doing pretty well for the year. We are at about 91% of meeting our goal from membership renewal fees! We are doing well in terms of donations as
- We're 80% for meeting our projected income, but we still have five months left. Revenue is down for both firearm ranges due to the virus.
- The pond is in trouble and needs some help and needs to be repaired before the end of the fiscal year. The issue is that the headwall is not concrete and the pipes are narrow, leading to significant erosion in the spillway. The plan is to widen the spillway and add necessary rocks/concrete/landscaper's cloth to prevent further damage.
- People need to contact Jeff Seaman and Carol Hulce-Efdimis about obtaining permission to come work on the property.
- Wildlife Committee: Trees are coming, couldn't be stopped. They will need to be planted in small groups over time. Trees are a variety for a variety of purposes.
- Garden Plots Committee: Going very well! Interest is high despite inability to use the farm.
- Log Cabin Committee: Bug treatment evaluations (termites) are in the works.
- Hunters Ethics: Registration is up and running online.
- ALL RANGES ARE CLOSED DUE TO EXECUTIVE ORDER.

NEW BUSINESS

- Motion to reimburse Phil Taylor for soil conference at \$80. Approved unanimously.
- Approve virtual attendance for membership requirement at the April 2020 dinner meeting. Approved unanimously.
- Move to fund complete repairs of the spillway project, including a concrete headwall, rip rap, and other improvements using \$25,000 in Capital Expenditure Funds and up to \$25,000 from Forest Mitigation Bank sale proceeds. Approved unanimously.



The Bethesda-Chevy Chase Chapter of the Izaak Walton League of America will sponsor its annual "Introduction to Hunting Seminar" on Saturday, June 6. If you have never been hunting before, know someone who would be interested, or had a disappointing experience yourself, you are encouraged to attend. Women, men, and teens are all welcome.

This nationally recognized and award winning training will include instruction and discussions about conservation and ethical behavior, the five W's and How of hunting, what is hunting success, preparing to go hunting, techniques and skills for being in the woods, trailing game, animal habitats and habits, choosing a tree stand location, safety and first aid, being skunked, what can you learn when you miss, advantages and disadvantages of hunting companions, choosing an appropriate bow, long gun, or muzzleloader and more. There will be plenty of time for questions.

This seminar does not replace the required Hunter Safety Education courses but is to supplement that course and to expand one's hunting knowledge. The instructors have had nearly 100 years of hunting experience and what they will share is intended to help participants have a more enjoyable time while hunting.

The seminar will be held at the B-CC IWLA Chapter House. Check in begins at 8:30am and we will start at 9:00am and continue until around 4:00pm. The cost is \$15 to cover materials. We will be walking in the woods and fields for at least a mile or more so participants should be prepared for that level of activity. Bring your own lunch, drinks, and wear clothes for outdoor walking and going through briars. Participants should make sure that their clothes are treated with Permethrin or bug spray and exposed body parts with regular





B-CC IWLA SUMMER BIATHLON PROGRAM 2020 PRACTICE SCHEDULE

All Dates Are Tentative. Check the **Chapter Website for Updates!**

MISSION: To provide a venue for novice through worldclass summer biathletes to learn and/or refine the skills inherent to the sport.

To provide a vehicle to introduce athletes of other sports to the shooting sports and consequently an understanding of firearms and the Second Amendment (B-CC IWLA members please recruit, in particular, middle school, high school, and collegiate athletes - freedom/liberty is never more than one generation away from extinction).

ELIGIBILITY: Summer Biathlon is open to all B-CC IWLA members 12 years and older, as well as, sponsored guests. B-CC IWLA members no range fee. Non-member rate is \$5.00 per session.

EVENT: Running distances at B-CC IWLA are set at 5 kilometers (3.1 miles) split into 5 loops or 3 - one-mile loops. Currently, a single course at each length has been laid out. A short course for those working up to the other distances has been laid out as well. The regulation shooting distance is 50 meters, however, targets are also set at 25 meters for development of the shooting art. There are four shooting stops on the 5km course and two stops on the 3-mile course. Shooting stops alternate between prone (lying down) and off-hand (standing) positions. Five rounds are fired at each stop for a total of 20 shots on the 5km course and 10 shots on the 3-mile course. An equal number of shots are fired from each shooting posi-

SCORING: Scoring is based on a time to complete basis. A penalty of either one (1) minute or a 50-100 meter penalty lap will be assessed for each shot missed.

EQUIPMENT: .22 caliber biathlon rifles are the standard; however, any magazine fed, .22 caliber rifle with either bolt or lever action is permitted. Only standard velocity .22 caliber target ammunition is allowed.

Farm Committee Report

The last few months have been very busy for the farm committee.

It is the time of year that we inspect, service, and repair all the farm equipment. One major issue we had to address was the steering valve on the large tractor that we were able to repair in house. We had some major repairs on the mowing equipment this year, and they too were fixed on site. Now all the gear is in good operating order.

The local Farm Bureau, Soil Conservation Districts, and Natural Resources Conservation Services (NRCS) conduct their educational seminars during the winter months. This year I attended the Delmarva Soil Health Summit held in Georgetown, Delaware with Duane Hovorka who is the IWLA Agriculture Program Director. The conference had many expert speakers. The speakers consisted of soil microbiologists, soil science professors and researchers, and expert farmers from all over the United States.

They discussed current research on chemicals, fertilizer, and cover crops regarding their effects on soil health. Other topics included the positive effects of no-till and equipment options and modification. I met some new friends and gained a wealth of knowledge on soil health that I plan on implementing in this years planting schedule.

In the first week of March, a wonderful group of volunteers helped to plant eleven wildlife fruit trees in the B4 field. The varieties that were planted were apples, pears, and crabapple trees. The Wildlife Group was the company we purchased the trees from and they specialize in trees for wildlife. The package of trees they put together for us was designed to produce fruit from late August thru January. Each tree will flower at different times of the year to keep our pollinators busy. The trees were shipped to us as bareroot four to five foot whips. I have checked on the trees and they are looking very happy and healthy.

In the month of March, we started our first planting of the fields on the farm. We had to start by mowing down last year's corn that was left standing for the wildlife in the B4 field. The standing corn did not allow us to plant a cover crop over the winter. You must keep a living plant in the ground to feed your soil biology to build up your soil health. The corn served its purpose providing wildlife food over the winter months. After watching the weather, we found a window of opportunity to plant when the fields were dry.

With some much-needed help from Blaine and Jack, we were able to plant a mixture of oats and spring peas in the B4 field. Oats have many soil health benefits that include erosion control, nutrient scavenging, weed suppression, and building organic matter. Spring Peas grow very well with oats. Peas are a legume. The soil health benefits that peas provide are nitrogen production, great root structure for soil conditioning, and attraction for pollinators. Both oats and peas are well liked by deer and turkey.

One of my goals this winter was to research a seed mix to benefit pollinators. The two seeds that we found for that purpose was Hubam sweet clover and Phacelia. Phacelia is a cool season plant that produces a purple flower that is highly attractive to bees as is Yellow sweet clover. Yellow sweet clover will bloom only in its second year of growth. We found a white Hubam sweet clover that is an annual (meaning it will grow and flower all in one season). We planted the garden field with that seed mix on the second week of April. I am excited to see the results. Farmers that have planted this mix rave about it.

We have received our soil samples from our fields and the results look great. One great result is our organic matter has increased almost one percent in the last two years - a great result from our farming plan and practice.

We look forward for the spring plantings. We began to order supplies to plant our sunflowers, summer cover crops, and corn. April is the month we begin mowing around the farm. I would like to thank Tom, Janet, Mike, Kevin, Ed, Jack, and Chip in advance for your help on the mowing needs around the farm this year. As I write this article the farm is closed, but I am hopeful things will open soon, and I wish everyone great health and happiness.

I hope to see you all around the farm soon.

B-CC Quiz Answer: The cactus (Opuntia) population found in the Shale Barrens on the Conservation Farm. The Eastern Prickly Pear (Opuntia humifusa) is the only cactus native to the northeastern and mid-Atlantic states. This low growing cactus is nearly, or totally without spines and in the summertime, bears bright yellow flowers. In winter the broad, green stems dehydrate and shrivel. As a result, the Eastern Prickly Pear is resistant to the relatively cold wet conditions of our area. If you see Opuntia on the Conservation Farm, be careful. It may have few spines, but it does have small tufts of brownish hairs called glochids. These tiny, hair-like tufts of barbed spines readily penetrate the skin and are very irritating.

NestWatch News

The coronavirus has quieted almost all human activity at the chapter; nonetheless, the annual springtime arrival of Purple Martins and nest building by overwintering Eastern Bluebirds have proceeded apace. Purple Martins scouts were observed flying over our two martin houses on March 26. Recall that this marvelous species winters in Brazil and other South American countries, then begins its arduous journey north in February to its breeding grounds. Scouts arrive first, then, a few weeks later, more adults. As of April 24, the martin houses and new gourd system had attracted 20 martins, perching on their porches and chattering with excitement. Incidentally, mornings at the chapter are a great opportunity to see and hear these marvelous aviators as they begin nest building and rearing their young.

For their part, Eastern Bluebirds began nest building in March. We found two nests with eggs down at the big pond on March 26. By April 17 the chapter hosted nine bluebird pairs with 30 eggs and four hatchlings. Ten days later, several more eggs had hatched and additional eggs were laid, bringing the total, as of April 27, to 35 bluebird eggs and 17 blue-

By April 27, Tree Swallows had begun nest building in three of our nestboxes, but had not yet laid any eggs.

Our NestWatch data is submitted to Cornell University's Lab of Ornithology for analysis. The project is conducted nationwide with thousands of participants reporting nesting data throughout the spring and summer months. If you would like to join the nest watching team, or simply join us on a trail walk, please email me at the address above. Bird watching is an extremely satisfying hobby, offering us a view into, literally, another world.

George Washington University and Georgetown University to Conduct Cicada Study

Two local ecology professors, Dr. Martha Weiss of Georgetown University and Dr. John Lill of George Washington University are beginning work on what will be a multi-year ecological research project in forested areas of the conservation farm. John and Martha are very nice and very knowledgeable about the plants and insects found on the



conservation farm. If you see them on the property or while walking through the woods, please stop and say hello. They



will be setting up their experiments along the trail between where the B-3 and B4 fields meet and the scout camp. They will not be working in the area of the scout camp itself. They will also be using the West Woods south of Clearing B near River Road. The trees they are studying are oak saplings and they will be clearly marked with orange and white flagging tape. One of the reasons they chose our farm is that we have lots of oak saplings growing in our forests. In other

parts of the area, deer eat the leaves of oak saplings, but because we maintain the deer population in balance, we have a healthy supply of oak trees. If you happen upon any of the trees they have marked, please be considerate and do not disturb their work.

Below Martha and John describe what they are planning to do over the course of the next few years:

"As some of you may know, next spring (May-June 2021), the Brood X periodical cicadas will be emerging by the millions. This only occurs once every 17 years and forested lands bordering the Potomac River have historically hosted record densities. We have spent most of our scientific careers studying plant-insect interactions and are excited to work together to investigate the 'ecological cascade' of interactions involving trees, birds, and caterpillars that will be altered when this incredible pulse of insect biomass occurs. As part of this project, we plan to monitor the emergence of the Brood X cicadas by placing several dozen small mesh 'emergence traps' both in the forest and along forest edges (staked to the

ground). They look like small pop-up tents and are actually just 'food covers' for picnic tables to keep flies away. When the cicada nymphs tunnel up to the surface, they will molt inside the tents and we will count them. The overwhelming majority will emerge next year, but there are always a few that are bad at counting to 17 and emerge a year early or a year late, so we plan to monitor emergence using these emergence traps over the next three years. If you happen to see one, please don't remove it! The traps will only be out during the month of May.

As some of you may recall from past emergence events (2004 and earlier), any animal that CAN consume cicadas DOES consume cicadas, including many local birds and mammals (and your pets - dogs and cats are notorious consumers!). For local birds that are in the middle of fledging their young, we predict that the abundance of nutritious insect biomass that will be present next summer will cause some of the birds to shift their foraging to focus on cicadas rather than their usual baby bird food: caterpillars. If our hypothesis is correct, then we should see an 'ecological release' in the local forests, with higher-than-normal caterpillar densities (due to decreased bird predation) next year. The extra caterpillars should then consume more leaf material, increasing the amount of damage incurred by local plants. To study this, we will be counting caterpillars and measuring the leaf damage on understory white oak trees in two locations on the property: along the trail that begins where the B-3 and B-4 fields meet and the scout camp and at the western end of the West Woods property sloping down to River Road. We will also be putting out small 'decoy' caterpillars on white oak trees at each location to gauge the level of caterpillar foraging by the local birds in both cicada and non-cicada emergence years. These 'sentinel caterpillars' are made out of nontoxic modeling clay and have been used in past studies to assess the intensity of bird predation at sites throughout the world. The soft clay retains the 'peck marks' of foraging birds as a record of their foraging attempts. Our trees are marked with orange and white striped flagging. We just ask that you not remove the flagging or disturb the trees.

We are excited to be working at this beautiful location and look forward to giving a talk and meeting the members at an upcoming monthly dinner, once gatherings are again permitted. A special thank you to the IWL-BCC board and to Arthur Belendiuk for providing access and supporting our upcoming research activities."
