President's Message

Sunday, 20 March 2022, at 3:49 GMT, – the moment when the hours of daylight and nightfall are equal all over this speck of dust in space that we call Earth. If things proceed as they have been, our Conservation Farm will be changing from cold, brown winter into renewal with green leaves, butterflies, and baby birds and animals everywhere ... yahoo!

Let's take a quick walk through the past. The Bethesda-Chevy Chase Chapter applied for its founding charter in 1935, at first meeting in members' homes, churches, and other available meeting places. Then, in 1949, the chapter members took advantage of a truly golden opportunity to purchase a 366-acre worn-out tobacco farm south of Poolesville, Maryland. The farm suffered badly depleted soil, limited access from local roads, and very little agricultural value – it was a worn-out tobacco farm.

You can see where I'm headed! Over the years, the Chapter added land to the Conservation Farm: the West Woods (in 1997), West Woods II (in 2006), the Northeast Woods in 2010, and another 50 acres in 2012. We now have 624 acres of very valuable, healthy farmland and woodlands, with restored and carefully managed soil, and with recreational activities available – all protected by legal conservation easements.

Our initial membership of 15 men has grown to over 1,000 members (with some of our members representing the third generation of their families' membership). We have become one of the largest and most active of IWLA's 300-plus chapters nationwide. And through wise management and member donations, we have built up a healthy financial reserve, managed by our Legacy Foundation. When additional lands become available for purchase, as they will, we want to be ready. Not bad for a volunteer organization! In fact, darned good.

This year, our national organization, IWLA, celebrates its 100th Anniversary: 100 years of supporting and promoting conservation, citizen science, outdoor activities and education. And as you can easily figure out, in 2035, just 13 years from now, B-CC will celebrate <u>our</u> 100th Anniversary!

So this month, as we start anew with the Spring Equinox, we have an opportunity for a spiritual and personal reset of our own B-CC goals. It is essential that we renew our resolve to work together to enjoy and share our knowledge, talents and blessings! Let's recommit to our intentions, establish new habits, learn something new, and set out together on our adventure. Who do we want to be, this spring?

My invitation -- and challenge – to you is this: find a quiet place today. Turn your gaze inward, and ponder the reasons you joined B-CC. Make a quiet promise to persevere, with strong back and good humor, in our community and our effort. As the fella said, "If we do not hang together, assuredly we will all hang separately!"

Savor the day! And may we savor our springtime together!

Summary of the January 2022 Board of Governors Meeting and the February 2022 Membership Meeting

Wednesday, January 26, 2022 – Board of Governors Meeting

- This online meeting was called to order at 7:30pm.
- Richard Latimer recapped the Chapter's liability and property policy coverages.
- Carol Hulce-Efdimis reminded us that the annual insurance audit based on membership is in process.
- President Lin Tate will convene an Environmental Committee chaired by Blaine Elkins that will include the range chairs and others.
- Treasurer Bill Brockman reviewed the Sandy Spring Bank account balances.
- 1st VP Walt Allensworth has proceeded to engage a member volunteer to repair the erosion damage on the road to the Big Pond. This may require 20 dump truck loads of millings.
- The Poolesville High School Global Ecology program will support two groups of students to pull invasives in March.
- The Maryland Division will meet in March. There will be discussion of an environmental scholarship focused on Western MD.

NEW BUSINESS:

- 1. With the February session cancelled, Carol Efdimis made a motion for the scouts to use the Chapter House for wilderness first aid training Memorial Day weekend May 27-29. The motion passed unanimously.
- 2. Bill Brockman moved that the Treasurer be directed to move Forest Mitigation funds to the BCC-IWLA Legacy Foundation. The motion passed unanimously.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:10pm.

Wednesday, February 16, 2022 – 1,036th Membership Meeting

- This online meeting was called to order at 7:30pm.
- Membership Secretary Meg O'Rourke made a motion to swear in prospective members Giovannangelo and the Wockleys. The motion passed unanimously, and 1st VP Walt Allensworth swore in the new members.
- As required by the bylaws, on January 31, 2022, Treasurer Bill Brockman transferred funds to the Legacy Foundation from the Land Fund.
- Members are advised that there is now a Farm Page on the Chapter website.
- Members are reminded to be cautious around dead/dying trees on the property; these will be taken down professionally soon.
- Vegetable garden plots are available
- The Chestnut Orchard is wintering hybrids for the American Chestnut Foundation.
- As Chair, Blaine Elkins summarized the efforts to date of the newly constituted Environmental Committee that is charged with orchestrating permitting and other preparation for the Shotgun Range lead reclamation. As a scopeof-work is finalized, the Committee will consider proposals from several civil engineering companies. Easement holders are being contacted.
- As the kitchen has been closed due to Covid, the County will be contacted concerning food service license renewal extensions.

The Chestnut Committee finished 2021 with planting some American Seedlings in the West Orchard to replace seeds planted in the spring that did not sprout. This was accomplished with the help of two groups from Poolesville High School Global Ecology program as well as member of the committee. By November every point in the west orchard had an American Chestnut seedling in place.

Looking to the spring, we will need to catch up on some maintenance of the mowers and a general clean up of both orchards. In the green house we will take down two of the squirrel proof enclosures and repair the third for one more year of use. The Maryland Chapter of the American Chestnut Foundation will be planting hybrid seeds in pots late March/early April depending on the weather. FeederWatch/NestWatch News

We have had a respectable counting season this winter despite the depredations of one or more bears in December and January. Let's review the species observed at our feeders, beginning in mid-November: The highest number of individual species counted at our feeders this season was 16; the highest number of individual birds reported per species on a single weekend was 171. The highest count for a single feeder species was 120 Red-winged Blackbirds in January, way above our Northeast Region's average of 4, followed by 56 Brown-headed Cowbirds in November, 15 Mourning Doves and 15 House Finches in December. Other species typically observed at our feeders included Northern Cardinals, Downey and Red-bellied Woodpeckers, Tufted Titmice, and Carolina Chickadees. Purple Finches were counted only on two weekends.

FeederWatch wraps up at the end of March. Many thanks to our energetic team: Bob Plumb, Jim Stables, Pat McNeilly, Tim Ames, Suzanne Novak, Brett Davis, Bill and Ayala White, Chuck Thornton, Suzanne Papiewski, Theresa Zmola and Pete Cappelino. Thanks to Suzanne Papiewski for donating a colorful new feederbird poster and to Larry Anderson, Wildlife Chair, who keeps our sunflower seed and suet well stocked.

In mid-March we will raise the Purple Martin houses and gourds, and we should begin to see Purple Martin scouts in the skies. A few early Eastern Bluebirds will begin nest building and egg laying. Please let me know if you are interested in joining the NestWatch monitoring team. We really could use more help; nest checking with data gathering is fun and an easy skill to develop. Plus, our team enjoys the immense benefit of spending time outdoors!

Farmers & Hunters Feeding the Hungry (FHFH)

As many of you know, the national organization FHFH (www.fhfh.org) (first established in Maryland in 1997) helps provide nutritious meat to feed the hungry. Deer, elk, and livestock donated by hunters and farmers to participating butchers and meat lockers are used by food banks and local ministries across the nation to provide much-needed protein to the meals fed by soup kitchens, pantries, and shelters. Donations to FHFH from individuals, churches, clubs (including B-CC IWLA), and others enable FHFH to pay the entire meat-processing bill for each donated animal so that hunters can donate their harvest free of charge.

FHFH currently has more than 125 local coordinators in 29 states, and provides an average of over 1.2 million meals per year to hungry children and families. Since the organization's founding, hunters have provided over 16.9 million meals, and over the past few years of increased food insecurity, that number continues to increase – B-CC IWLA has actively partnered with FHFH for more than a decade. If you have excess deer, elk, or even livestock, you can donate, or make a taxdeductible contribution, to support this effort.

The FHFH founder, Rick Wilson, spoke to a standing-roomonly B-CC dinner meeting last September, and our members continue to support the organization with meat or financial donations. If you have excess game, or excess dollars, you can easily participate in the effort. It's a worthwhile partnership!



Conservation Education Competition

Deer and other ungulates shed their antlers once a year. The shedding process usually takes between two to three weeks, but the antlers can fall off in as little as 24-28 hours. Deer shed their antlers between early December and March and this allows us to have our first **Conservation Education Competition**.

We are looking for the biggest antlers our members can find on the property. Between now and March 31st, we encourage our members to visit the Chapter to find the largest antlers on the property. Please send a picture of the antler, your name, the date and where you found it. This is a great opportunity to visit the farm with your family and explore.

Did you receive a blackpowder firearm as a present and don't know what to do with it? Are you ready to test your skills against others in the afternoon shooting match and compete for prizes? Don't miss out on this marvelous opportunity for knowledgeable instruction, loads of fun, and the



unique smell of blackpowder smoke!

Participants will meet at the Rifle & Pistol Range at 9:00am. Inlines, percussion or flintlock shooters are all welcome. There will be instruction time for new shooters or those with new muzzleloaders while "veterans" and more experi-

The Vantage Pro2 GroWeather is a state of the art weather station connected to the internet via the EnviroMonitor cellular gateway. An industrial-grade weather station engineered to handle the harshest environments and deliver data with scientific precision, the Vantage Pro2 provides weather data including temperature, wind speed/direction, air pressure and precipitation rates and totals.

Introduction to Hunting Seminar

The Bethesda-Chevy Chase Chapter of the Izaak Walton League of America will sponsor its annual "Introduction to Hunting Seminar" on **Saturday**, **June 4**. If you have never been hunting before, know someone who would be interested, or had a disappointing experience yourself, you are encouraged to attend. Women, men, and teens are all welcome.

This nationally recognized and award winning training will include instruction and discussions about conservation and ethical behavior, the five W's and How of hunting, what is hunting success, preparing to go hunting, techniques and skills for being in the woods, trailing game, animal habitats and habits, choosing a tree stand location, safety and first aid, being skunked, what can you learn when you miss, advan-



tages and disadvantages of hunting companions, choosing an appropriate bow, long gun, or muzzleloader and more. There will be plenty of time for questions.

This seminar does not replace the required Hunter Safety Education courses but is to supplement that course and to expand one's hunting knowledge. The instructors have had nearly 100 years of hunting experience and what they will share is intended to help participants have a more enjoyable time while hunting.

The seminar will be held in the B-CC IWLA Chapter House and outdoors. Check in begins at 8:30am and we will start at 9:00am and continue until around 4:00pm. The cost is \$15 to cover materials. We will be walking in the woods and fields for at least a mile or more so participants should be prepared for that level of activity. Bring your own lunch, drinks, and wear clothes for outdoor walking and going through briars. Participants should make sure that their clothes are treated with Permethrin or bug spray and exposed body parts with regular bug spray.

Wilderness First Aid Course Troop 496 and Troop 239

During the weekend of February 11-13, 2022, the Virginia based Center for Wilderness Safety held a CPR and Wilderness First Aid course at Bethesda – Chevy Chase (BCC) Izaak Walton League of America (IWLA). This course was sponsored by the Poolesville Boy Scout Troop 496 and used the B-CC IWLA Chapter house. Scouts and Adults from Troop 496 and Troop 239 (Darnestown Girls BSA Troop) participated in preparation for their weeklong High Adventure trips this summer to Sea Base. The following are comments from some of the participants describing what they learned in the course:

One thing I liked about the course was that all of the content is applicable to my life, and could be used on my future boy scout trips. I especially enjoyed the simulation of an event that led to injuries that we completed at the end of the course. One thing that I did not know was how to do proper CPR before this course, and when to do it. I hope to never need to use my new skills, but I would be confident in my abilities if I would need to.

The course was really fun. The instructor was amazing and made long sessions of powerpoint fun. The course covered a wide range of topics but if I were to choose one thing I enjoyed learning about the most was how to treat altitude sickness. This was very helpful to learn about because I know with the Boy Scouts trips we may take there could be cases of altitude sickness.

The weekend I spent with the Center of Wilderness Survival was the best weekend I've had since covid started. I learned how to treat a wide variety of illness and injuries, and am much more confident in my skills for when I'm out in the wilderness.

The CPR and first aid training was incredible. It was well structured and covered a huge amount of material. It also presented everything in a fun way that was easy to understand. It is hard to name just one thing that I learned because I learned so many new things. But if I had to choose, I would say learning about how to build makeshift splints for any occasion was interesting and useful.

The scouts and adults that attended this course would like to thank the IWLA for the opportunity to use their facilities.

2021 Big Pond Creel Census Report

The seventh voluntary creel census was conducted in 2021 at the big pond (Walton) which provides "catch and release" fishing for B-CC IWLA members and accompanied guests. The first reported catch was on March 11, 2021, and the last catch was reported on November 25, 2021. As in the past, the purpose of this census was to continue gathering information on angler interest, fishing effort and catch success, and to get an idea of the abundance and species composition of the fish resource in the big pond. Anglers were requested to enter their fishing information and catch results in the logbook in the metal box on the kiosk near the shelter. The following summarizes the data voluntarily provided by anglers for 2015-2020 and 2021.

The amount of fishing pressure or effort in the big pond was less in 2021 compared to 2020. In 2021, there were 131 angler trips with 265 total hours fished. In 2020, there were 156 angler trips with 320 hours fished. For the previous six years the average number of angler trips was 102 and average number of hours fished was 205. The average number of angler trips per month for 2021 was comparable to 14 in 2020 but higher than the average of 11 for the years 2015-2019. One angler made 71 trips to the big pond which accounted for 55 percent of all angler trips reported for 2021. The highest number of angler trips per month in 2021 (26) occurred in July while the highest per month in 2020 (28) occurred in May. The highest number of angler trips per month (40) reported to date occurred in April 2017.

The number of largemouth bass reported caught in 2021 (522) was about 43 percent greater than that reported in 2020 (365) and was the highest catch reported since the voluntary creel census was started in 2015. One angler reported catching 25 largemouth bass over 10 inches during the evening of June 5th. Fifty-three percent of the largemouth bass reported in the logbook were caught by one angler. This angler reported catching two 7-pound largemouth bass. The reported catch of bluegills in 2021 (100) was much less than reported in 2020 when 191 bluegills were caught; the catch rate was also less in 2021 (0.38/hr.) compared to 0.6/hr. in 2020.

As shown in the above table, the total hours fished (265) and angler trips (131) were down in 2021 compared to 2020 when the total hours fished was 320 and angler trips was 156. A possible reason for an apparent decreased fishing interest at the big pond in 2021 is that there were some extremely hot days in the summer of 2021 and the blue-green algae bloom which resulted in a short-term water contact advisory. This likely deterred some anglers from going down to the big

pond during prime fishing time. There was no lack of largemouth bass as the number reported was the highest since the voluntary creel census was implemented in 2015. However, it is not known whether or how many of the largemouth bass were caught multiple times since there was no marking to track catches. Bluegill catches were down in 2021 and this may have been due in part to predation by largemouth bass or that most anglers were targeting largemouth bass. Further, largemouth bass will readily take bait (worms) used for catching bluegills which could have contributed to the number reported. The electrofishing study conducted in May 2021 did find an abundance of largemouth bass in the big pond. The study recommended that largemouth bass 8" - 12" be removed to reduce competition for forage thereby allowing the largemouth bass greater than 12" to grow bigger and the smaller largemouth bass to fill the gap left by removal of the 8" - 12". A subsequent electrofishing event in October in combination with anglers did remove about 100 largemouth bass 8" - 12" long. Further, 125 pounds of golden shiners were stocked in the big pond for forage to supplement the bluegills preyed upon by largemouth bass. There were two successful bluegill spawnings as confirmed by the capture of nearly 300 fry/fingerlings in late summer.

The 2021 catch data indicates an abundance of largemouth bass as documented in the May electrofishing study. In short there is an imbalance in the fish community structure consisting of largemouth bass and bluegills. The number of bluegills caught in 2021 was about half that reported in 2020 which would suggest heavy predation on the big pond's primary forage species. Forty-two percent of the reported bluegill catch was under 5" which is within the ideal size range available for largemouth bass predation. Right now, it is uncertain if removal of 8" - 12" largemouth bass during the October electrofishing study has had any effect on restoring the predator prey balance in the big pond. Another voluntary creel census will be conducted in 2022 and anglers will be requested to remove 8" - 12" largemouth bass. A further electrofishing project to remove 8" - 12" is being considered.

The Ponds & Streams Committee thanks those anglers who took the time to enter their big pond catch data in the logbook.

There's a gang of Wild Turkeys stalking America -

In Washington, DC, a hen turkey appeared outside my home office window on its way toward Georgetown. It was watched carefully by a police informant Fish Crow in case the turkey was planning mischief.

In New Hampshire, a motorcyclist crashed after being assaulted by an enraged turkey.

In New Jersey, a terrified postman rang 911 after a dozen members of a turkey gang prevented him from leaving his truck to deliver the mail.

That's the bad news.

The good news is that turkeys are a conservation success story! By the early 1900s,



America's wild turkey population had been reduced to about 30,000 birds—a smaller number than exists today for several species with an uncertain future. Today seven million turkeys live in North America, occupying almost all suitable habitat and expanding beyond their original range, courtesy of sportsmen and women, and Conservationists like you.
