Summary of the February 2022 Board of Governors Meeting and the March 2022 Membership Meeting

Wednesday, February 23, 2022 - Board of Governors Meeting

- The meeting was called to order at 7:35 PM.
- President Lin Tate introduced Blaine Elkins, chair of the newly-constituted Environmental Committee, whose remit includes the shotgun range (SGR) lead reclamation permit application. Blaine apprised the Board of the Committee's efforts to date and breakdown of future steps to be taken.
- Treasurer Bill Brockman gave an overview of the Sandy Spring Bank accounts. On January 31 funds were transferred from the operating account to the Legacy Foundation.
- Carol requested that the Board consider the Chapter hosting a 5-day Cub Scout summer day camp. Activities may include fishing, STEM sessions, BB shooting and fishing. The Scouts provide their own food and drinks and are insured.
- Membership numbers are basically unchanged so there will be no change in insurance bill.
- The Board was pleased to hear that Carol Efdimis successfully got multiple years' property tax overbilling straightened out, with a refund from the County.

NEW BUSINESS:

1. During the last BOG meeting it was apparent that a non-Board member had been made privy to BOG emails that should have been private. Accordingly, Dave Boynton made the following motion:

"that ALL communications, written or verbal, between BOG members are confidential and may not be disclosed by any means or manner to any non-BOG member without express prior approval of the BOG."

The following discussion noted the Chapter's departure from most board practices in permitting non-BOG members to participate in board meetings. After discussion, Dave amended the motion as follows:

"that all written communications among BOG members and all verbal communications during Executive Sessions among BOG members regarding any and all BOG matters are deemed confidential and shall not be disclosed by any means or manner to any non-BOG member without the express prior written approval of the BOG."

The motion passed. It is unclear if adoption of this motion will require amendment to Chapter bylaws.

2. Victor Kernus made the following motion:

"to allow NAVHDA the ability to use the large pond and surrounding grounds on April 9th and 10th in case McKees (sic) is not available and on June 11th and 12th for use of the Chapter House in the morning, the A3 field and the large pond for their dog events." The motion passed unanimously.

- 3. Meg O'Rourke made a motion that three eligible prospective members be admitted as members. The motion passed unanimously.
- 4. Walt Allensworth made a motion to engage Anderson Tree Service, Poolesville MD, to take down 5 dead trees on the farm, pending confirmation of licensing and insurance.

Wednesday, March 16, 2022 - 1,037th Membership Meeting

- After an outstanding St. Patrick's Day dinner of corned beef and cabbage, the meeting was called to order at
- Membership Secretary Meg O'Rourke and Tucker Mostrom facilitated the introductions of 19 prospective members. Meg made a motion to swear in two prospective members. The motion passed unanimously, and 1st VP Walt Allensworth swore in the new members.
- Phil Taylor reports planting a new fruit orchard by the B3 field. Seven of 10 planned trees have been planted. Phil is waiting to see if Antietam Blush, a novel resistant apple cultivar, will be available. These are in great demand. There are 21 fruit trees by the B4 field. Costs for fertilizer, seed and herbicide have gone up markedly. Seed has been ordered. The Weather Station is up and running and links are in the Newsletter and on the Farm Page.
- Note that 20601 Izaak Walton Way is not a registered USPS mailing address.
- Dean Naujoks from Potomac River Keepers Network will speak at the April 20 membership meeting.
- Bill Gordon reports that the 100th Annual Convention in Peoria, III. will be memorable and there is a youth program before the convention. Izaak Walton's The Compleat Angler is the most-published book in the English language.
- Blaine Elkins reported on the progress made by the Environmental Committee shepherding the SGR lead reclamation project. The committee distributed a scope-ofwork to contractors and bids should be available by the end of March. The Rural Legacy easement holder, the County Ag department and several other state and county agencies need to be informed of plan and progress.
- Ted Whitehouse likened the Legacy Foundation to a university endowment.

TALKS FOR THE GOOD OF THE CHAPTER:

- Janet Lamkin noted that a number of past presidents attended this meeting and noted their great value to the Chapter.
- Mark Gochnour described the Fort Frederick Colonial Market Fair to be held April 21-24.
- Andy Wight noted that the Family Campout is open to non-members.

A bear has finally been caught on our game camera checking out the suet and seed feeders we use for the FeederWatch project. This is at least the third time the feeders have been molested this year and similar attacks have occurred at our beehives. Our cameras have also recorded numerous visits at the feeders by foxes, raccoons, squirrels and opossums, none of which caused significant damage. While the damage caused by the bear is annoying, it is also a tribute to the quality of the habitat we have on the farm that we can support a bear(s).

Wildlife Committee Report

The 2021-2022 deer season has drawn to a close. We had a fair year on our farm. 18 deer were reported taken on our farm, on the lower end of the scale (16-25) that got reported each year. Thank you all that reported their deer and from the reports, and again, some nice mature deer were harvested. Across the state, MD DNR reports that 7,0845 deer were harvested during deer season (all weapons), which is 13%

lower than last year. No one cause was offered for this decline, but inclement weather may have kept some hunters out of the woods. In Montgomery County, the reported deer harvest was 19% lower than last year. From casual observations, we did seem to have a "normal" number of members out on the farm in pursuit of deer.

Even with the wet weather and muddy conditions, now is a good time to wander around the farm and explore, the leaves on the trees and bushes have not blossomed yet making it easy to see through the woods. During the upcoming weeks, bucks will have finished shedding their antlers leaving them as prizes in the woods. If members find sheds that they don't have a use for, please consider contacting our group that puts on the global ecology programs, they have uses for visual aids in their demonstrations.

The 2022 spring turkey hunting season is almost upon us. The regular season starts April 18th and runs through May 23rd, Junior spring turkey hunting is April 16th. Hunting hours are one-half hour before sunrise until noon through May 9th when the hours change to one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. There is no Sunday turkey hunting in Montgomery County.

All chapter members wishing to hunt on our farm must:

- 1) Have a valid MD hunting license (including all necessary stamps, i.e. HIP stamp for doves)
- 2) Have a current and valid B-CC IWLA membership card as proof of permission to hunt on private land
- 3) Have a current and valid parking sticker displayed on their vehicle
- 4) Register on our website to acknowledge understanding our rules and property boundaries. This is a yearly requirement.

We are a large chapter with many hunters and nonhunters that all enjoy a day in the field, so we ask that everyone be safe, courteous and respectful in their activities on our

Please report any sightings of bears on our farm to the wildlife committee; we have had sightings this year, and we like to believe our habitat is healthy enough to support an occasional bear or two. Bears in Montgomery Co. are protected and should not be harassed.

American Chestnut Update

We have started with the spring maintenance. The weed block and battens have been dressed up in the West Orchard and that work has started in the East Orchard. We also weeded the 7 Chestnuts planted next to the farm committee's fruit orchard at the North East end of the B4 field. Unfortunately, the pure Americans planted at the east and west ends of the row have already succumbed to the blight and had to be removed.

Of the 3 Chestnuts planted for the Walk in the Woods, Larry, Moe and Curly, Curly succumbed to the blight and we have not figured out what got Moe. We will plant replacements April 2.

We will remove 2 of the squirrel-proof enclosures, repair the third and clean up the green house area on the April 9 workday. The Maryland chapter of the American Chestnut Foundation will be planting hybrids in pots and placing them in the third enclosure on the 17th of April.

This should be a quiet year of tending the orchards.

Black Powder / Muzzleloader Event

Due to a personal emergency for one of the muzzleloading instructors, the Muzzleloader Day has been postponed until a Saturday in May (either May 14 or 21), 9:00am -4:30pm. After the new date is selected, a new SignUpGenius will be sent out. Those that registered using the original SignUpGenius will be given priority.

Did you receive a blackpowder firearm as a present and don't know what to do with it? Are you ready to test your skills against others in the afternoon shooting match and compete for prizes? Don't miss out on this marvelous opportunity for knowledgeable instruction, loads of fun, and the

unique smell of blackpowder smoke!

Participants will meet at the Rifle & Pistol Range at 9:00am. Inlines, percussion or flintlock shooters are all welcome. There will be instruction time for new shooters or those with new muzzleloaders while "veterans" and more experi-

enced shooters will sight-in their guns.

Bring the muzzleloader that you want to shoot or let Mark Gochnour know in your email that you would like to try one out so he can arrange for a loaner. Learn directly from individuals having experience and knowledge. (Mark is a certified NRA/NMLRA Blackpowder Instructor.) If you have never fired

a black powder gun or you have one you have never used before or are having issues with one you have forgotten about in the gun safe, come during the morning but stay for the shoot! Last year, one shooter used a loaner gun to compete in the shooting match and turned out to be excellent marksman!



Lunch will be served in the Chapter House around 12:00 noon with the shooting competition beginning at 1:00pm.



Match Participants will be provided opportunities to shoot at some unusual novelty targets again this year, including last year's favorite - The Flopping Plate. Targets will be shot at a variety of ranges from up close and out to 100 yards with prizes awarded to individual shooters. An overall Grand Prize could be a frozen turkey or ham. Due to safety issues, only muzzleloader shooting participants will be

allowed to use the Range since the availability of shooting lanes may be limited. (After the afternoon shooting match, Range Officers and their guests may shoot.)

Brood X Cicada Research at the B-CC IWLA Conservation Farm

During the spring and summer of 2021, our team of ecologists from Georgetown and George Washington Universities was busy conducting research in and around the scout camps and in the open areas near the chapterhouse. Ecologists Martha Weiss, John Lill, and Zoe Getman-Pickering, along with their student helpers, are now two years into a longterm project investigating how the emergence of millions of

periodical cicadas – a once-in-a generation event – alters the feeding relationships of the forest community. Our team observed the foraging activities of an array of insectivorous birds, recording which species were feeding on the abundant cicadas, and continued their weekly monitoring of bird predation on 'fake' clay caterpillars affixed to understory oak trees, which handily record the number of bird pecks. In addition, we recorded the abundance and diversity of caterpillars found on the oak trees before, during, and after the



cicada emergence and periodically measured the amount of damage that the oak leaves received from the abundant caterpillars.

Our results provided strong evidence that the cicada emergence provokes a dramatic shift in forest ecology. We found that most bird species readily caught and ate the cicadas, or fed them to young in the nest. As predicted, during the cicada emergence, which was a veritable smorgasbord of readily available insect treats, the peck marks on the caterpillars dropped off significantly, and both caterpillar numbers and levels of leaf damage on the oaks also increased. At the end of June, when the last remaining adult cicadas were heard calling at the site, the number of peck marks on the clay caterpillars began to increase, returning to pre-emergence levels seen in the previous (non-emergence) year. These exciting results are among the first to document the ecological impacts of this infrequent (but highly predictable - every 17 years!) pulse of insect biomass on the forest community that has been home to these noisy creatures for millenia.



Repeating our forest censuses for the next couple of years will allow us to determine how long it will take for the ecological interactions to return to their precicada levels. With two years of data from B-CC IWLA in-hand (2020-2021), we submitted a grant proposal to the National Science Foundation this past winter that, if funded, will allow us to continue our cicada research through 2025. The first scientific paper from this research, focus-

ing on the shift in bird foraging, is in preparation and will be submitted for publication soon.

We are grateful for the many B-CC IWLA members who contributed observational data on bird-cicada interactions and who have generously provided data on the nesting success of purple martins near the chapterhouse. We also appreciate the ongoing support of Arthur Belendiuk (and his faithful dog Magic!) and Carol Hulce-Efdimis, who have greatly facilitated our research and access to the B-CC IWLA Conservation Farm. We kindly request that chapter members do not disturb study trees that are marked with flagging (either pink or orange and white). If you see us out in the woods this summer, stop by and say hello. It has been a privilege to work in your beautiful forest, and we are most appreciative of the opportunity!

The trap league will start on Saturday, June 4 and finish on Saturday, July 23. The league is open to all club members and immediate family at this time.

This will be a ladder type league that has been used in other sports; because of our clubs small number of shooters it will level the playing field!

All shooters will be ranked high to low based on their average. Shooter in position one will shoot against the shooter in position two, three against four and so on. The league will consist of 50 birds, 2 rounds of 25 each week. Each round will be worth 1 point (2 points possible) and the winner of the 2 rounds (total of the 2 rounds) gets 1 point. Maximum of 3 points each week per person. Loser gets 0, ties split. The person with the greatest number of points at the end of the league will be declared the winner.

Averages will be retabulated after each week's shoot and all the shooters move up or down the list to reflect their new average, and their new opponent for next week. Do you need to shoot with your opponent, NO! Could be fun though and encouraged. You can shoot on a squad with your buddies at 9:00am and your opponent may not shoot till 10:30am, no problem.

The idea is that each shooter will always be shooting against the person closest to them in average and ability, no handicaps. This way everyone has a good chance of winning; all you need to do is keep beating your opponent. As you get better and start beating your opponent your average gets better, you'll move up and shoot against better competition. It's possible you'll shoot against a different opponent each week!

The league will run for 8 weeks, the first 2 weeks will establish your average. Those rounds will also be placed in your bank account to be used if you are unable to come on a league day. The banked rounds will then be used for the score you would have shot. The order of usage is first in, first out. The competition begins on the third week and will run for six weeks.

If we are able to more forward with the trap league, the next email will be to sign up and provide addition details.


