Summary of the March 2022 Board of Governors Meeting and the April 2022 Membership Meeting

Wednesday, March 23, 2022 – *Board of Governors Meeting*

- The meeting was called to order at 7:40pm.
- President Lin Schmale-Tate asked attendees to summarize what their best hopes and worst fears are for the Chapter.
- Treasurer Bill Brockman reviewed the Sandy Spring Bank account balances. P&L Budget performance is on the right track as renewals continue to accrue.

ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION:

- Carol Hulce-Efdimis discussed moving purchase of a shotgun range wobble trap to the funded CAPEX list.
- Jerry Murray discussed moving installation of a concrete base on the rifle side of the R & P Range and at the range house to the funded list. This also includes construction of a concrete ramp for Chapter House.
- The Archery well, which also supplies the campground, greenhouse and chestnut orchard, needs attention, with corrosion of its control panel and a removable cover. An above ground shed would be best.
- Three of the five-dead/dying trees have been removed. When the area around the Big Pond dries up some, Anderson can bring their equipment in.
- Carol Hulce-Efdimis explained the particulars of hosting a Cub Scout day camp at the chapter. The goal is outdoor activities; the Chapter House would be the backup for inclement weather. Mr. Latimer confirmed that Chapter indemnification is not an issue
- The Shotgun Range has dealt with increasing maintenance expenses not accommodated by its current budget. These include electrical upgrades, invertors, covers for the skeet machines and pricier clay pigeons. Accordingly, the committee requests additional funds to supplement their current budget.
- Carol Hulce-Efdimis noted that IRS and Chapter bylaws (Article IX Gifts, Donations, or Contributions) requires that specified donations require a Board vote to assign such monies to a restricted subaccount for the desired donee. Otherwise donations would by default go to the Operating Account.
- Blaine Elkins reviewed the progress made so far by the lead reclamation/environmental committee. A scope-of-work has been distributed to four engineering firms. The plan must be presented to and approved by number of agencies. Mr. Gorski will interface for us with these agencies.
- Because it would be meant to be a permanent structure, Ponds and Streams requested Board approval of a permanent charcoal grill by the Big Pond, covered under its budget. P&S will address ash removal and means of fire prevention.
- President Tate has appointed a Bylaws Committee chaired by Byron Ricketts for review of possible amendments. This committee would report to the BOG in June.

NEW BUSINESS:

The Board decided on 7 motions:

- 1. Janet Lamkin made a motion to move the shotgun range wobble trap platform to the funded list. The motion was seconded by Ron Marchessault and passed unanimously.
- Janet Lamkin made a motion to approve use of the Chapter and its facilities for the BSA Seneca District Cub (continued on page 3)

Scout day camp from June 20, 2022 to June 24, 2022. The motion was seconded by Ron Marchessault and passed unanimously.

- 3. Janet Lamkin made a motion that the donation from the Rural Women's Republican Club will be used for conservation education programs for kids during dinner meetings. Walt Allensworth seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.
- 4. Janet Lamkin made a motion for an increase in the shotgun range operating budget from the Management Reserve account. Bill Brockman seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.
- 5. Janet Lamkin made a motion for funding of the concrete for the Rifle & Pistol Range side and range house and the access ramp at the Chapter House. Ron Marchessault seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.
- 6. John Stinson made a motion for approval of installation of a permanent charcoal grill at the Big Pond by the Ponds & Streams Committee. Walt Allensworth seconded, and the motion was approved unanimously.
- 7. Ron Marchessault made a motion that the Board hold a meeting to discuss two possible bylaws amendments and to finalize language on two bylaws discussed previously on March 14. John Stinson seconded, and this motion passed with one nay vote.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:15pm.

Wednesday, April 20, 2022 – 1,038th Membership Meeting

- Featured Speaker Dean Naujoks from Potomac River Keepers Network gave a very well received presentation, despite being in an accident on the way to the Chapter during which his car was totaled. PRKN is a non-profit with the responsibility for 14,000 sq. miles of the Potomac and Shenandoah watersheds. Dean has a decades-long background in waterway stewardship. He briefly reviewed successful Clean Water Act enforcement initiatives against major polluters including but not limited to Dominion Power, NRG Energy (Dickerson plant), Morgantown and others. He reviewed a variety of polluting effluent sources including the DC combined system and Alexandria's direct discharge. The enormity of plastic pollution, its consequences and mitigation were reviewed. Urban stormwater drainage is the worst offender. Water quality is essential to North/mid-Atlantic striped bass, 80% of which are spawned in the Chesapeake and vulnerable to microplastics. Members are encouraged to see the documentary "Story of Plastic" (Discovery). Dean addressed many thoughtful questions from the members.
- The business meeting was then called to order at 8:35pm.
- Chapter cleanup was on April 9 and very successful with 33 members and committee chairs showing up, along with Girl Scouts. Walt Allensworth made special mention of the lunch crew. The Farm Committee trimmed branches, repaired the tractor and is getting ready for planting. Ponds and Streams installed turtle platforms in both ponds, removed three trees near the Big Pond, and performed general cleanup.
- Jerry Murray reported the Environmental Stewardship Committee's signing of a contract with Wetlands, Inc. They will provide engineering services in preparation for shotgun range lead reclamation.
- Non-renewing members are having their cards deactivated.

Montgomery Bird Club Annual Spring Walk Data from Jim Nelson's Summary Report

Data from Jim Nelson's Summary Report

The Montgomery County chapter of the Maryland Ornithological Society held its annual spring walk at the Conservation Farm on Sunday, May 1, led by Jim Nelson of the Bird Club and escorted by Larry Anderson.

Our Conservation Farm is considered a "hot spot" on eBird (www.eBird.org) based on the number and variety of species observed at the farm over the years. In total, 143 species have been recorded (primarily by sight, a few by sound) at the farm. Our first eBird record was made in June 1965. This year, during the walk, the Montgomery Bird Club added four new species to our eBird list: Blue-headed Vireo, Louisiana Waterthrush, Blue-winged Warbler and Pine Warbler. In all, fifty-three species were recorded on this year's walk and submitted to eBird.

Woods, hedgerows, streams, fields and ponds provide a wide range of habitat and migration is underway, so that early May is an optimum time to enjoy birding at the farm. Among the species observed and counted were 40 Northern Cardinals, 8 Orchard Orioles, 25 American Goldfinches, 17 Red-bellied Woodpeckers, 12 Eastern Towhees, 6 Common Yellowthroats, and Ovenbird and a variety of other warblers. Please let me know if you would like to see the full list of the 53 species identified during the walk.

Many thanks to Larry Anderson who escorted the participants and to Jim Nelson who organized and led the walk.

2022 Members Interpretive Walk In The Woods

The 2022 B-CC IWLA Members "Interpretive Walk In The Woods" was presented by Mark Gochnour, Gregg Gochnour, Blaine Elkins, and Butch Mezick to 15 new and current members of the Bethesda-Chevy Chase Chapter on Sunday, April 10th.

The day of the walk was cold and windy, but the weather was soon forgotten as we explored the wonders of nature. As the attendees started their walk by hiking up a steep hill, we discussed soil erosion and the formation and composition of that precious natural resource, "Topsoil." Invasive plant species such as bush honeysuckle was discussed and observed at our next stop, followed by a presentation by Blaine Elkins at a small grove of blight-resistant chestnut trees located at

the top of the hill. The walk next stopped at a pile of trash where we discussed the incredible longevity of different types of trash; a Styrofoam bait container lasts one million years before it decomposes. Our guests were then taught to identify three oak trees, red, white, and chestnut, by their bark and leaves. Buck rubs and buck scrapes were discovered as we progressed on the walk. We reviewed zoning laws, development in general, and the Montgomery County Agricultural Reserve as we stood in an obsolete power line right of way. Next, the components of habitat required by all animals were explained, as was the devastating impact of human development on all other plants and animals in the natural world. The Federal Aid in Wildlife Restoration Act, better known as the Pittman-Robertson Act, was highlighted with its contribution to date of over 18 billion dollars to wildlife and wildlife habitats since its inception in 1937. Full-size turkey decoys were observed, and the incredible eyesight and hearing of turkeys were discussed, followed by a demonstration of turkey box, slate, and mouth calls. Previously planted items such as a deer skull complete with antlers, a snakeskin, turkey feathers, and animal bones with teeth marks left by animals in the pursuit of calcium were discovered by our students as they became "seers" of the natural world. The incredible natural process of photosynthesis explaining how trees are created from carbon dioxide and water under the influence of the sun's energy was presented, including a bit of information on why a leaf is green. We proceeded to the exam area. Yes, our "Interpretive Walk In The Woods" includes an exam where the attendees work individually during a period of silence in an area rich in examples of topics previously discussed. Each student was asked to explain what they found and share information about their discovery. A short stop by our abandoned well was followed by a pleasant walk as we returned to the chapter parking lot.

Presenting interactive programs such as the "Interpretive Walk in the Woods," the B-CC IWLA will provide conservation education to the present and future generations of conservationists. – B-CC IWLA Conservation Committee

Introduction to Hunting Seminar

The Bethesda-Chevy Chase Chapter of the Izaak Walton League of America will sponsor its annual "Introduction to Hunting Seminar" on June 4th. Women, men, and teens are all welcome.

The seminar will be held at the B-CC IWLA Chapter House. Check in begins at 8:30am and we will start at 9:00am and will continue until around 4:00pm. The cost is \$15 to cover materials.

This nationally recognized and award winning training will include instruction and discussions about conservation and ethical behavior, the five W's and How of hunting, what is hunting success, preparing to go hunting, techniques and skills for being in the woods, trailing game, animal habitats and habits, choosing a treestand location, safety and first aid,



being skunked, what can you learn when you miss, advantages and disadvantages of hunting companions, choosing an appropriate bow, long gun, or muzzleloader and more. There will be plenty of time for questions.

We will be walking in the woods and fields for at least a mile or more so participants should be prepared for that level of activity. Bring your own lunch, drinks, and wear clothes for outdoor walking and going through briars. Participants should make sure that their clothes are treated with Permethrin or bug spray and exposed body parts with regular bug spray.

This seminar does not replace the required Hunter Safety Education courses but is to supplement that course and to expand one's hunting knowledge. The instructors have had nearly 100 years of hunting experience and what they will share is intended to help participants have a more enjoyable time while hunting.

Shotgun Range Trap League 2022

The league will run for 8 weeks, the first 2 weeks will establish your average. Those rounds will also be placed in your bank account to be used if you are unable to come on a league day. The banked rounds will then be used for the score you would have shot. The order of usage is first in, first out. The competition begins on the third week and will run for six weeks. The trap league will be only on Saturdays, starting on Saturday, June 4 and finishing on Saturday, July 30 with a 9:00am start time. There is no league on July 2 because of the July 4th holiday weekend. The league is open to all club members and immediate family at this time.

This will be a ladder type league that has been used in other sports, because of our clubs small number of shooters it will level the playing field!

All shooters will be ranked high to low based on their average. Shooter in position one will shoot against the shooter in position two, three against four and so on. The league will consist of 50 birds, 2 rounds of 25 each week. Each round will be worth 1 point (2 points possible) and the winner of the 2 rounds (total of the 2 rounds) gets 1 point. Maximum of 3 points each week per person. Loser gets 0, ties split. The person with the greatest number of points at the end of the league will be declared the winner.

Āverages will be retabulated after each week's shoot and all the shooters move up or down the list to reflect their new average, and their new opponent for next week. Do you need to shoot with your opponent, NO! Could be fun though and encouraged. You can shoot on a squad with your buddies at 9:00am and your opponent may not shoot till 10:30am, no problem.

The idea is that each shooter will always be shooting against the person closest to them in average and ability, no handicaps. This way everyone has a good chance of winning; all you need to do is keep beating your opponent. As you get better and start beating your opponent your average gets better, you'll move up and shoot against better competition. It's possible you'll shoot against a different opponent each week!

NestWatch Report

Nesting activity got off to an excellent start in April, with Eastern Bluebirds producing 42 eggs and three young in 12 nestboxes before the end of the month. In addition, the first Tree Swallow nest on the Conservation Farm has a clutch of 7 eggs, quite unusual for this species, which normally produces



five or six eggs in a clutch. We can expect much more Tree Swallow breeding activity in May.

Our Purple Martins are back in droves! By late April they had claimed nearly all the compartments in the houses and gourds (which they seem to prefer). It is such a delight to hear them vocalizing, noisily, as we check their houses. But they seem to tolerate our nest checking quite well; unlike the bluebirds and swallows, the martins do not dive bomb us as we check each nesting tray. In early May I estimated nearly 100 martins flying overhead while our team checked their abodes. They will be laying eggs beginning in mid-May.

Come out to the chapter and spend some time watching the maneuvers of this season's huge Purple Martin colony. They put on a splendid show.

Recently, Theresa Zmola was able to quickly videotape a clutch of bluebirds hatching in one of the field boxes at the chapter. Below is the link to the video. As a reminder, never open the nest boxes as it could cause chicks to fall out or adults to leave.

News from Dry Seneca Creek

The ponds and streams committee at B-CC IWLA organizes stream quality monitoring at a few sites near the conservation farm throughout the year. On April 3, several volunteers enjoyed a beautiful spring day by exploring a new sampling site at Dry Seneca Creek just east of the farm.

While the new site showed great promise with plenty of water flowing over a rocky stream bottom, looks can be deceiving. While the water chemistry was good, the biological sampling only rated the stream as fair. This exemplifies why the type of sampling we do is so critical for an understanding of local streams.

When we sample the chemical water quality of a stream, we get an instant snapshot of what the quality is like. It's like



when you've cleaned up your house before having friends over for dinner, or someone stops by without notice and sees all the laundry on the couch: it's just one instant of what your living conditions look like and doesn't necessarily show what the normal conditions are, or how bad it can get during certain times. We may see the stream with normal flows a few days after a flood has subsided. When the water was high, lots of chemicals may have washed off the land, but we don't see those when we come after the flood.

Biological monitoring is when we look at the organisms that are alive in a stream at the time we sample it. Most of



these organisms are the juvenile life stages of insects, but some like fish or crayfish could be several years old. These show us a longer-term record of the water quality. If an organism is present, it means the water quality has been "good enough" for it to survive for its entire life. If the water quality was chronically poor or there was a short event that made the quality unsuitable for that organism to live, it won't be present.

We sort the organisms we catch into three categories based on the sensitivity to pollution. If we find many that are sensitive, that indicates the water quality has been pretty good for a while. If we only find those that are tolerant of pollution, there have been some issues with water quality that has allowed those species to live, but not allowed other sensitive species to persist. The more different types of animals we find, and the more sensitive those are to pollution, the better we say the water quality is.

In order to compare our samples at different times and locations (many groups of volunteers collect similar data across the US in all seasons) we use a standard method each time. After we're done with our standard sampling, we like to poke around, turning over rocks and netting in other areas just to see what we find. This is when it gets interesting. In our post-sampling exploration we found several new



organisms (including the hellgramite that doubles as an earring). We know they are present in the stream, but we can't count them towards the report of our standardized sampling.

So while we had to rate this beautiful stream as a "fair" quality stream, we know there is more there to explore. We hope to return to this site for our summer or fall sampling this year. If you're interested in seeing if we find more sensitive organisms and can rate this stream as "good" or even "excellent" please join the Ponds and Streams Committee for our next outing. Are Cover Crops Really Good for the Soil?

Our own Rachael Behrend wrote the paper below as part of her application for a scholarship from TOCA (Turf and Ornamental Communicators Association). She used Phil Taylor's work on the farm as the basis for the article.

To qualify to apply for a scholarship, a student must be in a green industry or pursuing a major or minor in technical communications. Rachael is a Public Horticulture Major.

At the Bethesda-Chevy Chase Izaak Walton League of America (B-CC IWLA), member Phil Taylor has been using cover crops for over four years now. Before Phil Taylor started using cover crops, the soil was clay, which made it difficult for roots to penetrate. With clay soil, standing water after a rain storm isn't a rare sight. Yet in four years, the organic matter went from roughly 2% to 3.5-4% with much less standing water after a storm.

When deciding what cover crop would be best to plant, Phil Taylor explained that it was important to look forward to what crop you will be planting come Spring. It is also important to consider what will survive and thrive where you live. At the B-CC IWLA, winter rye is used as one of the winter cover crops, since it will germinate at temperatures as low as 38 degrees Fahrenheit. The winter cover crops will protect the soil by keeping living roots in the soil. This makes sure that, throughout the year, "in all the fields something green is growing."

When it is time for the next crop to be planted, the cover crops need to be killed to allow the next crop to take root. At the B-CC IWLA, this is the only time that chemicals are used throughout the entire planting process. To disturb the land as little as possible, the herbicide is sprayed once and natural processes take over. This is to ensure that the cover crop doesn't compete with the new crop for nutrients. But don't think that the cover crop needs to be removed. Leaving it there will not only add more nutrients back into the soil, it will also protect the new crop from sun and drought until it can survive without this shield.

Scalding from the sun and drought are only some of the problems that crops can have. One of the largest problems would always have to be pests. Since Phil Taylor tries to avoid using chemicals when possible, the way the crops at the B-CC IWLA are protected is with friendly insects. In the fields that are not being used for crops, mixes of flowering cover crops that draw in beneficial insects keep the pests from causing a major problem. These cover crops not only look pretty and keep pests away, they also keep pest control expenses down.

For those who are just starting to use cover crops, "you need a mentor, someone who's already doing. That way they're like your coach," according to Phil Taylor. He also said that he avoided making many mistakes thanks to the advice and experience from his mentor. "There are a lot of people out there who are willing to teach to those who are willing." To look at a farm with cover crops in use, that is one of the best ways to learn and understand how to use cover crops.
