President's Message

We've had some semblance of Winter so far and hopefully we see more than a glimpse of some more. We have now moved out of deer hunting season and with Spring Turkey season about to start, as a member, it is your position to know our Hunting Rules and Regulations.

The Board of Governors received a report stating that a member was riding an Ebike on the trails. The Facilities Use Regulations state, "Privately owned vehicles must remain on the graveled roads or parking lots at all times. Any exception to this rule must have the approval of an officer of the Board of Governors," and the Hunting Rules under #5 state, "Hunters are prohibited from driving off any road on B-CC IWLA property." There are signs posted regarding no motorized vehicles.

The Board of Governor, under advisement from the Hunting Ethics and Oversight Committee, has brought this to the table for discussion. We are working on the language that would encompass the following:

- privately owned modes of transportation that include cars, trucks, ATVs, UTVs, E-bikes, motorcycles, mountain bikes, and horses are not allowed due to the risk of soil displacement and erosion on our trails and in our fields. Game carts and in some cases, a wheelbarrow has been used, would be acceptable during hunting season
- Committee Chairs would have the availability to grant permission to any member who is working with that committee to be able to drive on the property.

At the February Board meeting this topic will be on the agenda to finalize.

Spring is just around the corner so I am planning for the speakers at the dinner on topics such as the Chapter's Bee Apiary and the Cicada study that was done on the property with information on the double brood emerging. If you have other ideas or connections for speakers, let me know.

In addition to ensuring safe drinking water, these results allow us to monitor the impact of development outside our property, the containment of lead on our ranges, and the quality of our streams and ponds for aquatic life. The Chapter member who has been escorting the lab technician to the designated sites for the past 20 years is retiring from this duty and we are looking for one or more member(s) to take over this important work. The process takes a couple of hours once a month on a weekday.

Summary of the December 2023 Board of Governors Meeting and the January 2024 Membership Meeting

Wednesday, December 20, 2023 - Board of Governors Meeting

- President Carol Hulce-Efdimis called the meeting to order at 7:59pm.
- WSSI's latest invoice was discussed. Motion to approve was made by 2nd VP Jerry Murray to forward invoice to Legacy Foundation for payment of reclamation for calculating the locations of the last 7 points needed for the construction stake-out survey. Motion approved.
- Chartering request from Scouts of America for Chapter to charter two new scouting troops and one pack. Discussion about pros / cons of chartering additional groups including concerns about property usage were raised; also suggested that increasing the number of scouting troops can be used as an opportunity to increase membership. Motion was made to approve becoming charter organization for Troop 773B, Troop 773G and Pack 773. Motion approved.




His most stalwart friends came from the B-CC community. He appreciated

Team Navy Trains with Apollo Archery for International Competition

In our second year of operations, Apollo Archery was proud to host numerous guests at the B-CC IWLA Chapter including Navy athletes preparing for national and international archery competitions.

One athlete, CAPT Suzanne Brown, USCG (ret.), will be our guest speaker at a chapter dinner meeting in 2024. Suzanne trained with us for both the Department of Defense Warrior Games held at NAS North Island in San Diego, CA from June 2-12, 2023 and the Invictus Games held in Düsseldorf Germany from September 9-16, 2023.

The Warrior Games are an annual adaptive-sports competition organized by the Department of Defense and hosted by U.S. Army Training & Doctrine Command (TRADOC). This year is the 13th anniversary highlighting the exceptional physical skills and mental toughness of seriously wounded, ill and injured active-duty and veteran service members.

Team Navy was comprised of 34 active duty and veteran athletes, 31 Sailors and 3 Coast Guardsmen. It is part of the Navy Wounded Warrior's adaptive athletics program, which is open to service members and veterans in the U.S. Navy and U.S. Coast Guard with non-combat or combat-related injuries and physical or psychological illnesses. Recovering service members rebuild their strength and endurance, while also drawing inspiration from their teammates.

Initiated in 2014 by Prince Harry, The Invictus Games was created with the goal of giving soldiers who are wounded, injured or ill in body and soul a greater awareness and recognition in society and to support their path in rehabilitation. For 2023, the 6th annual games took place for the first time in Germany. The host city of Düsseldorf and the German Federal Armed Forces (Bundeswehr) were proud to jointly host this unique international sports festival.

Under the motto "A HOME FOR RESPECT" the city, together with the German Federal Armed Forces, welcomed around 500 competitors from 21 nations as well as around 1,000 family members and friends to compete in ten disciplines.

Team Navy attended Apollo Archery's regular sessions held on the first Wednesday of each month - plus additional sessions organized and hosted by B-CC IWLA Chapter members. All Apollo leaders are USA Archery certified instructors, and Apollo provides all of the equipment participants need to practice archery. The Navy Wounded Warrior's adaptive athletics program acquired equipment for their competitive athletes, which they used while training at our range. We were thrilled to hear their stories and learn of their successes upon their return from the competitions.

Thank you to the entire Chapter for maintaining our open spaces and for welcoming our recovering heroes.

Stream Monitoring

While I was putting extra water on my tomatoes, saving water by not washing my car, and trying to not run my boat aground on newly exposed rocks in the Potomac, there were some interesting opportunities provided by this summer's drought. If you got a chance to explore the farm this summer, you found dry streams that acted as cleared trails through the property. When the woods are full of thorn choked trails, the sand and rock bottom streams provide an easy path to travel. The streams were great for us to walk through, but for the organisms that require water to live in they weren't so great. One reason we conduct water quality sampling is to see how seasonal changes and major events, like this past years' drought, affect the potential for streams to support life.

On December 30, five members took chemical and biological samples to measure the stream health of one of the tributaries of Horsepen Branch on the conservation farm behind the archery pavilion. The chemical tests suggested the stream was in good to excellent condition, based on the immediate quality and the chemicals that were present the day we sampled. The biological sampling showed it only as fair. While this is a lower rating than we've measured in the past, it is still surprising based on the drought of the summer. Even more interesting was which animals we found.

Biological monitoring relies on the fact that which organisms are present is based on how the water conditions have been for the past while, not the immediate measure as the chemical test does. We found nine different types of organisms that have been living in the stream for a while. Five of these types of organisms, but the vast majority of the individuals captured, were aquatic organisms that spend their entire lives in the water, such as scuds, aquatic worms, leeches, and clams. These species have to have a way to survive drought conditions as they must have access to water all year. Other types or organisms we found, which represent very few of the individuals in our sample, are the juveniles of insects that hatch and fly around as adults. Fly anglers will recognize the mayflies and stoneflies, while everyone knows the midges (gnats). It appeared that the number of aquatic insects was much lower following the drought, while the number of organisms that live in water all year had not changed as much.

Aquatic organisms have many adaptations to survive drought conditions. Organisms that are more mobile may abandon a drying stream. Some larger organisms, like many fish, just move downstream to larger bodies of water when small streams are getting smaller. Insects may metamorphose and leave the water as adults, relying on future generations to lay eggs in a stream later or for eggs or young to drift downstream from tributaries. Some of the lifelong inhabitants move down into sediments. As you dig down in a streambed, you reach the hyporheic zone. This is a wet layer of sediments and blurs the boundary between surface water and groundwater. During dry periods when the surface water levels drop, the hyporheic zone may still be wet enough to sustain life as cool water comes up from groundwater. Many of the scuds and other organisms we found had probably been living through the summer in the hyporheic zones until recent rains filled the streams again and they could return to the surface waters. We hope to see more insects return in the spring as adults move from downstream areas to lay their eggs in the streams that flow through the farm. We also hope

that you can join us for future sampling sessions. Contact John Novak or Dan Dutton if you are interested in seeing what is in our creeks this spring.

Black Powder Day / Muzzleloader Event



Seneca Christmas Bird Count Birds Counted on the Conservation Farm

On December 17, 2023, members of the Montgomery Bird Club under the leadership of Jim Nelson met well before sunrise at the chapter house to participate in the annual Christmas Bird Count. The count has been conducted nationwide since 1953 under the auspices of the National Audubon Society. We have hosted a portion of the Seneca Sector 7 count for several years.

Participants at the farm were organized into two groups, escorted by Larry Anderson. The groups walked the west woods and fields for three-to-four hours, noting the species they observed. Separately, Pat McNeilly counted birds at the feeding station located behind the chapter house. Pat's count was submitted to Cornell University's Lab of Ornithology as part of our FeederWatch project as well as included in the CBC totals. Counters returned to the chapter house as the morning ended to tally their observations.

Jim Nelson's report of birds observed at the chapter appears below.

These are the total birds counted on the Conservation Farm by two field parties on the Farm, one feeder watcher at the Chapter House feeders, and one observer who listened for owls before dawn from the road. Species total - 42 (up from 41 last year). Total birds counted - 1,997 (way up from 453 last year). Species not found in 2022 are marked with an *. Parenthetical comments compare some totals to last year's count on the Farm or to this year's count in the rest of Seneca CBC Sector 7, of which the Farm is a part.
