- Phil Taylor introduced a group from Alarms.com who would like to use our ranges to evaluate their new outdoor shot detection sensor.
- Carol nominated Byron Ricketts to fill the open position on the Legacy board.
- Blaine Elkins provided an update on the lead reclamation process at the shotgun range. We are waiting for MT2 to respond to our questions regarding their proposal to use chemical encapsulation on the range. We are looking into getting updated pricing on the proposals for the other parts of the project.
- Treasurer Bob Kelly provided a report with our current account balances. Bob also discussed our current accounts system and recommended we convert the Land Fund and Management Reserve accounts to interest bearing accounts.
- The current 'CAPEX' accounts are to be renamed the 'Near Term and Long Term Capitol Fund Accounts'.
- Deborah Behrend provided an update on the chapter finances.
- Phil provided an update on the field plantings and reported that a bear got into the pear orchard and broke down one of the trees.
- Dave Mecklenburg gave an update on the log cabin.

NEW BUSINESS REQUIRING A MOTION:

- Motion was made to convert the Management Reserve and the Land Fund accounts from checking accounts to interest bearing accounts. Motion passed.
- Motion was made to accept the 4 applicants as chapter members. Motion passed.
- Motion was made to accept Carol's nomination of Byron Ricketts to fill the vacancy in the Legacy Board. Motion passed.
- Motion was made to set a minimum amount of \$1,000.00 for applications to access capitol funds. Motion passed.

The mail method is easy but takes extra time for delivery and pickup. You increase your exposure to identity theft by writing a check and mailing it. This is now the most common way to have your banking information stolen.

2. In person at a dinner meeting

The second way is to see me at a dinner meeting and hand me a check or cash. This is a more preferred way to renew and will require a copy of your renewal notice.

Report Your Bird Bands Online: WWW.REPORTBAND.GOV

Each year state and federal biologists mark tens of thousands of migratory birds with numbered leg bands. Hunters who report bands recovered from harvested birds receive specific information on when and where the bird was banded while providing important information for migratory bird management. The 1-800 telephone number for reporting bird bands has been discontinued. Hunters who recover a banded migratory bird should now use pwrc.usgs.gov/BBL/bblretrv/. Anyone reporting a band will need the following information: the band number, hunters name and address, and the date and location (nearest town) of the harvest.

Eagle Scout Receives Recognition

I recently had the opportunity to witness Jason Woodman. B-CC IWLA member and an Eagle Scout from Troop 1094 in Darnestown, receive recognition for his conservation efforts in the Town of Poolesville. His notable achievements include creating a half-acre pollinator habitat in Poolesville.



Maryland, which earned him Daughters the of American Revolution (DAR) Conservation medal and the Glen A and Melinda W Adams Eagle Scout Project of the Year Award for the National Capital Area Council (NCAC). This project involved planting 391 native pollinator plants to support wildlife, including endangered monarch butterflies, and attracted significant community support and engagement.

Additionally, Jason pursued and earned the prestigious Scouts of America Boy Distinguished Conservation

Service Award (DCSA) by working on various conservation initiatives. His second project, involved a multi-pronged approach. First, Jason and his team built and installed 9 monofilament fishing line recycle bins to protect local wildlife from discarded fishing line at local Poolelsville ponds. Next, he created fish habitats by sinking 30 Christmas trees into the local John Poole Middle School pond, providing crucial cover for young fish and benefiting the overall ecosystem. Finally, he built 4 cavity nesting boxes that were placed at a hidden pond to attached wood ducks or other cavity nesting birds. In order to earn the DCSA, Jason not only had to complete and lead others in these projects, but he also had to prove his projects made an environmental impact. This endeavor took Jason 2 years to complete. Jason is only the 3rd scout in NCAC and the 1st in Maryland to earn this award. Fewer than 50 scouts have earned this award nationwide.

Congratulations to Jason for his commitment to the environmental stewardship and leadership within the scouting and Poolesville community. Jason is a Junior at Poolesville High School and plans to study Wildlife and Fisheries when he attends college.

Blackpowder Day 2024 Update

Postponed from March for several reasons when it is usually held, Blackpowder Day occurred on National Hunting and Fishing Day - September 28th. There was a small number of shooters which enabled Keith Midberry, Larry Hess, and Mark Gochnour to work directly with four shooters and assist them in their use of their guns. In the morning time, Keith worked with a new shooter, Aram Roston, and introduced him to flintlocks. Larry worked with Nita Adkins with a percussion rifle she has shot in prior years. Mark helped with two shooters – Steve and Dick who had brought their own flintlocks but they had not shot them recently. Targets were shot close in to verify that guns and their loads and the shooters were all lined up and round balls were hitting accurately on the targets in nice groups.

Dan Neuland, Hunter Education Regional Coordinator for our region, recorded Mark showing how to prepare a muzzleloader for shooting. Mark went through the steps to verify the rifle was unloaded, then checked to see if the flint was lined up to spark effectively, and then he demonstrated how to load, prime, and shoot the flintlock. The procedures would be the same steps for a percussion or inline firearm with the exception of firing off a cap or two before loading. Mark used Larry's percussion rifle to show how to cap a percussion muzzleloader. The group of observers were the Blackpowder Day participants and the assigned Range Officers. Both received an orientation time for shooting themselves and the ROs were made more aware of what someone on the range

shooting a muzzleloader would be engaged in doing. Dan wanted to use the recording at the Maryland Muzzleloader Certification class for Hunter Education Instructors which is scheduled at the Frederick County IWLA on October 5th.

The morning training time enabled each "student" shooter to get acquainted and involved in loading, shooting, and troubleshooting any issues. Steve's percussion rifle had to have the hammer hit each percussion cap two times all day long. When he went home he found a longer nipple and upon replacement, the rifle is working just fine. Some shooters would get frustrated when there are problems but since the three helpers were there, who have experienced these same things, they were not as overwhelming. Despite Mark's best efforts. Dick Schaeffer's rifle ended up with a round ball stuck in the barrel that could not be removed.

The afternoon was spent shooting offhand at hanging and wind swinging balloons at 50 yards, plastic golf balls at 20 yards, and a large and a small bottle cap at 25 yards, splitting playing cards at about 12 feet from a kneeling position, and

at a paper buffalo target at 90 yards off cross sticks while sitting on a stool. (Not the normal targets but as a special event, they are approved.). These unique targets provide a different and additional dimension and challenge to shooting which makes it more fun as well as gratifying and satisfying when the targets are hit.

Last year before moving out of the area, Greg Mueller donated an assortment of muzzleloading supplies which were used as some of the prizes. The top prize winner was Keith Midberry who chose a box of 100 round balls. Nita Adkins came in second and chose a powder flask. Mark came in third

and choose some 3Fg blackpowder. Larry chose the annual Giant gift card to purchase a ham or turkey. Steve chose a box of lead balls for his .50 caliber rifle.

Thanks to RO Ray Edwards for coming out in the morning to observe and to Dave Daley who was Blackpowder Event Range Officer and has come to almost every Blackpowder Day for years. We appreciate the regular Range officers checking everyone in and making sure all were safe over the course of the day -John Kipfer, Mark Ziner, Paul

Wildlife Committee Report

Early deer muzzleloader season starts on Thursday, October 17th and runs through Saturday, October 19th. In region B (our region) muzzlerloader season continues Monday, October 21st and continues until Saturday, October 26th. Antlered deer may be harvested only October 17th through October 19th; antlerless deer may be harvested throughout the 10-day season. There is no muzzleloader deer hunting on Sundays during this season. Deer archery season is open throughout the muzzleloading season and archery hunters may hunt on Sundays until 10:30am. We ask that all members, whether hunting or not, wear something with high visibility colors while on the farm during deer firearms sea-

New this year, the Chronic Wasting Disease management area has been expanded to include all of Montgomery County. Please consult the MD DNR Hunting regulations on the impact of this change and for a list of CWD approved deer processors.

As a reminder, our chapter follows the guidelines and rules of MD DNR hunting on public land by not allowing baiting on our farm. This restriction will also apply to salt blocks and licks. Likewise, tree stands, ground blinds or any other hunting equipment may not be left overnight in the woods. These prohibitions are designed to give all our hunters/members equal access to spots in the woods.

We ask that all hunters be safe, courteous to fellow members, read and follow our rules and respect the all property lines. B-CC IWLA chapter website has our updated rules and a variety of methods to distinguish our property lines. The Chapter's Trail Guide on the website is a good way to familiarize yourself with the trails and the boundaries of our Conservation Farm.

All members intending to hunt on our farm must acknowledge that they have read our rules and understand where our property lines are by registering on our website. This is a yearly requirement. Besides registering on our website, all hunters must have with them:

- current hunting license with all applicable stamps
- photo ID
- current B-CC chapter membership card
- current vehicle decal displayed on their vehicle

We do not have permission to hunt or go on any of our neighbor's properties. In the event that you wound an animal and it expires on the property owned by Joe Morin located to the north and west of our farm on several different boundaries, or the property owned by Vikki Van Winkle located north of the NE Woods you may enter their property only after calling them and asking permission. You must not enter their properties with a weapon of any kind. Joe Morin (301 674-5397) Vikki Van Winkle 301 379-3560.

Our farm is considered private property (MD-DNR land code 430 for harvest check in), and your current valid membership card is used as the written permission to hunt as required by MD DNR and must be carried along with your valid hunting license. Also, a current B-CC IWLA chapter vehicle decal must be visible in all vehicles on the farm. We ask that deer and turkeys taken on our farm be recorded either in our game logbook, located outside the chapter house's main door; or by sending an email to andupton9@hotmail.com. When reporting your deer or turkeys, we ask for the following information; your name, doe or buck (antler count), date and weapon used, and the total number of ticks found on the

ears of your deer. Other details may also be included such as estimated weight or unusual features.

Statewide only 2 bucks may be taken throughout the hunting year, only one of which can have less then 3 points on an antler. Only one buck may be taken in a weapon year. A bonus buck may be taken in region B (our region) after purchasing a bonus buck stamp and can be used for any weapon season, still maintaining the antler point restrictions. Fluorescent pink is an approved legal color like fluorescent orange that hunters must wear to promote hunter safety. This change will require all of hunters to watch for 2 colors in the field that will alert us to the presence of other hunters.

Bears are protected in Montgomery County, and we adhere to the policies setup by MD DNR. We ask that all of our members be aware of the possibility of encountering a bear does exist while on our farm.
